READING ROOM

I thought it appropriate to give an update on the availability of the Reading Room. The Reading Room is now let all week during school time to Muddy Boots pre school which looks after around 50 children of residents of the village. It takes a considerable amount of time and effort to put up and take down all the equipment that is required to ensure that the Pre School runs smoothly.

The income we now receive has enabled us to upgrade the facilities available. This includes replacing the old heavy and cumbersome chairs, which no longer met the current fire regulations and the heaters which were old and expensive to run and broke down on a regular basis. We have now installed Eco-Friendly heaters.

As a result of the above the Reading Room is not available during school times. It is, however, still available during school holidays and half-terms for meetings, parties etc. The cost for hiring has been frozen for some time and still remains £4 for the first hour and £3 for each additional hour.

MOVEMENT 2 MUSIC – KEEPING YOU ACTIVE FOR LIFE!

My M2M sessions are taking place throughout the Wealden area at present, at many different schemes and with various levels of support and funding. It is hoped that these, and new venues, will continue and grow, giving much needed benefit to the 'older' community. What is it? –

Basically, the sessions consist of an hour's exercise/movement, some chair-based and some standing, but all done with fun, a lot of laughter and, generally, a good sing-a-long!

I have found, over the last 8 years since I developed this regime of exercises, that the benefits are huge and invaluable, in a variety of ways; and I have become quite passionate about the subject!

Firstly, the Physical aspect – There is no age limit to this activity, all my exercises and routines are adaptable to the participants..... My youngest member of all the groups is about 60, but the oldest was 104...yes, 104!!!.. and, no matter how 'able' the person, there is much to be gained from stretching, circling, swinging and swaying – dancing! - to whatever degree. One of my ladies, Molly (in her 80's) said the other day as she arrived for class " My shoulders have gone North, I can't seem to get them down they're so stiff..." After the first two exercises, which involved stretching by reaching up to the sky, then gentle shrugs and 'pops' and slow head turning, she said, with relief, that she could feel a welcome respite from the 'wooden coat hanger' feeling she'd previously had! She had also sung along to the two tunes while exercising, so taking her mind off the effects!... Another of my ladies has not got a good lung capacity, but as I take the classes she listens to how to breathe properly, and as deeply as possible, calmly does her best, and is pleased to inform me, when she returns from her check-ups, that the Hospital staff are impressed with her fitness! I do have gentlemen in some of my sessions, and one lovely chap in his late 80's is developing Carpel Tunnel in his fingers, alongside the Arthritis that's already there. He has benefited from the wrist circling, hand stretching and finger exercises, playing 'imaginary pianos'. I can empathise with many of the participants as I have Arthritis in my spine, top and bottom, due to injuries sustained in my career as a T.V and West End Dancer and Actress. I know how painful the back becomes when it 'gets stuck' and feels like a block of iron. I've

spent hundreds of pounds over the years on Osteopaths to keep everything in alignment and moving. But, in total agreement with the recent documentary on T.V on this subject, I do NOT believe that taking painkillers is the cure for joint pain... but that exercise and improving general mobility IS. It is a common fact now that, as we go over the '50' mark, we are ALL suffering from various forms of back pain, some Arthritis will have taken hold in wrists, knees or feet, and some can also start suffering nerve pain; with the awful 'Sciatica' being one of the most depressing and debilitating forms. By doing these routines, or Dances – which they progress through the hour to be- the whole body is gently toned, stretched and moved, from top to toe, pain is relieved hugely, and the brain has a bit of a work out too...!!

So- secondly, the Mental aspect – I am convinced that these classes are vital to mental health and wellbeing. The Movement to Music sessions are a fun filled way of exercising, learning new movements, co-ordinating arms and legs – always a fun challenge! While reliving eras that have musical relevance in people's lives, if they remember the 60's they WERE there! It's just great seeing eyes lighting up, with voices raised in song while doing 'The Twist'...even if it's sitting on a chair in a Hall somewhere! Finally, the third aspect – for want of a better 'sound byte'... A good old get together! So many of the classes / sessions are with a mix of residents from either within a residential venue, or in community halls with groups and societies; people from the local area who have friends, or have seen an advertisement in their Doctors Surgery, or nearby shop, and have grasped the mettle to come and join in. Sometimes it takes guts to do that, people get used to 'being on their own' after a loved one has gone, but the sessions bring so many new friendships together and become a regular 'Club', with groups 'going for a coffee' afterwards, or joining other activities/outings. Some of the regular participants get quite cross if I have a couple of weeks 'Off' from the sessions, like at Christmas....well, there's no rest for thewicked as they say!

So in conclusion, I would just like to say that these Movement 2 Music classes, are an essential new skill for the Older but still Active person, to keep going and thrive.

We must make sure that a long life lived, is Active, Fulfilled and Fun.!!

DID YOU KNOW... this month is about a newspaper extract regarding Hooe Parish Council, from the Bexhill Observer dated 9th March 1935 – "The (Annual Parish) review referred to the fact that the (Hooe) Parish Council completed its 40th year last December, and in its 40th year it now worked under the Local Government Act of 1933". On further investigation, the Parish Council was formed by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1894 which established elected Parish Councils in rural areas. Meetings were held quarterly. Therefore, by my reckoning, Hooe Parish Council completed its 125th year last December.

Worms Eye View

I always think of March as a month of many weathers, and it has always been notorious for blustery and boisterous winds. It is named after Mars, the god of war and in olden days was called Hyldmonath, meaning the windy or stormy month. I think perhaps the months have gotten themselves confused because as I write this in February the high winds are becoming very tiring.

Garden seeds are having to wait until the ground is a little drier, it really is still very wet, not only in the garden but across the fields as well, even the sheep are leaving footprints as well as me!

But thinking of gardens and its produce besides the lovely snowdrops, daffodils and primroses, who are defying the weather and bringing us a lot of pleasure, I have been thinking of other uses of vegetables. For instance, the potato when raw can help headaches. You can cut the potato into slices and press one or 2 slices into your forehead. Some folk say that they help migraines in this way. Also, potatoes can help burns. I know this for a fact, as when a friend spilt some boiling water over her hand, we guickly sliced up a potato and put the slices on her hand. It eased the pain and there were no marks left afterwards.

Likewise, if you got stung by a wasp, a bruised onion was rubbed onto the sting. Lots of homemade poultices were made and used when I was small, admittedly that was a long-time ago, but I do remember some and they were effective. Bread poultice, bread soaked in boiling water, then wrapped in muslin was used for easing burns, scolds, boils and abscesses of various kinds. A hot onion poultice was recommended for boils and bruises too, whilst honey and nettle poultice helped to ease rheumatism and a caraway seed poultice eased earache if it was applied to the outside of the ear.

It was said that a spider's web could stop bleeding. Apparently, one gathered a handful of spiders 'webs', rolled them into a ball, then flattened it and covered the wound with it. It strikes me that there were more cobwebs to be found in olden days, but I do believe that a spider's web is both the strongest and lightest material you could find. Another story about spiders' webs is that half a pound of spider's web would stretch around the world!

Now you will read this in March not on April 1st, so I am not trying to fool you, and don't forget "A windy March foretells a fine May" 21

The project is at an extremely exciting position and is moving forward.

On Saturday 8th February the Village Coffee morning was well attended, the hall was crowded and the atmosphere relaxed and friendly. Coffee mornings are held on the second Saturday morning of each month from 10.30 am where not only coffee and cakes are on offer also our Free Community Book Exchange which is proving ever more popular. More than one person commented that 'Our coffee mornings continue to bring in the crowds so we need a bigger hall'. Proof is in the pudding!

The Parish Council is concerned about those few thoughtless dog owners who continue to allow their dogs to foul our footpaths and pavement and spoil our village for all. The Council is grateful to Carol Foord who diligently sprays yellow paint on dog dirt and approaches offending owners. The paint spray is acting as a great deterrent.

This month the Parish Council has reported a number of concerns to ESCC and to our MP Huw Merriman. These include the littering on the A.259, the lack of diversion signs when the A259 is closed following a RTA, resulting in lost vehicle drivers needing to stop to ask where they are and how to get to where they want to go. Routes have also been blocked when 2 HGV's come face to face on a narrow lane. The Council has also complained about deep potholes invisible when filled with water and a skating rink when that water freezes and increased and ever larger vehicles using our road as a rat run.

Although the Hooe Parish Council meets only every other month the work never stops and so, if you have complaints, concerns or indeed praise please do not wait until the next meeting, contact any parish councillor who would be pleased to hear from you

The Ninfield full council meeting was a week early this month. The council doesn't normally meeting in January, but this doesn't mean that the Councillors weren't still hard at work. Another representation was sent in to Wealden District Council regarding Manchester Road, 2 residents and a Parish Councillor also attended and spoke at the unusually timed Planning Committee South Meeting. Sadly our concerns were not listened too despite being well researched and backed up by policy.

The news that the proposed Wealden Local Plan had been rejected by the inspector, primarily due to their lack of 'duty to cooperate' was released at the beginning of January. Wealden have decided to withdraw their plan and start again. This means that the number of houses that Wealden are expected to build will be more than they planned for in the rejected plan. If you would like to understand more please get in touch with the clerk.

Before Christmas the Parish Council applied to Wealden to begin a Neighbourhood Plan.

What is a neighbourhood Plan? A shared vision for your neighbourhood. The views of the residents are used in the decision making for lots of different topics.

Once approved our policies are used in our village. We can Identify and protect local green space, protect the environment, Enhance biodiversity, decide what types of houses are built, where and what they look like and protect the listed buildings and history of the village whilst looking at what is needed for the future.

We have been granted permission to start our Neighbourhood plan and there have been three meetings so far. There is a steering Group that is meeting monthly, they have developed terms of reference and there will be a monthly update at the Parish Council meetings where progress decisions will be made.
