

Dear Friends,

So, we are officially into Autumn! You could have fooled me with the heatwave we are experiencing as I write this! Many of us will have our own ways of marking the change in seasons. For some it could be a family anniversary which falls when the days lengthen or shorten or perhaps a sporting event. Well, for me, its geese, conkers and The Last Night of The Proms. It doesn't matter what the official start date is, once these three things are in place it is Autumn. So get out your thermals... Perhaps I should give you a bit more explanation. Well, we have just returned from our annual trip to Scotland. For Scotland the weather was quite good! One thing we did miss this year were the flocks of geese! However, when they are there, it's a bit of an obstacle course as the Canada Geese are normally back in large numbers after their summer break. The geese themselves are not the obstacle but the enormous amount of poo they produce certainly is, still it is a small price to pay for enjoying the company of such lovely creatures. There can be as many as 200 birds bobbing about on the loch or scouting about in the grass, although so many people feed them, that they don't need much grass. I love to watch them take off and land. Why they were not there yet I do not know? Maybe it's another sign of global warming. And so to conkers; apparently the first recorded game of conkers was on the Isle of Wight in 1848. I must say I would have expected it to be a much older game than that as I am sure boys and, it still seems to be mostly boys, would have spotted the potential for a good game well before that. For the last week or so children have been rushing back to school or more accurately rushing towards the Horse Chestnut trees in the churchyard on the way. Sticks are used to try and knock the conkers down and the more adventurous lads climb up to reach the largest ones. I get the distinct impression that boys do not climb trees quite as often these days as their climbing skills are distinctly worrying.

My final sign of Autumn is the Last Night of the Proms. The memory of many Saturday nights on the sofa waving a union flag and singing along to Rule Britannia remains. The Last Night of the Proms still signals the last night of summer for me. Last Saturday we dutifully watched it again. But before we get too gloomy let's just think a bit more about these signs of the time, because I think they all have something to teach us.

We all know the formation that geese fly in, the distinctive V shape; I suppose it is aerodynamic. Whether the geese know that is another matter but what they do know is how to work together. They share the load and if one goose tires the others will lend support through the power of their wings assisting with lift. They also rotate position so that all the hard work is not

If you have ever played conkers, you will remember all the mysterious processes involved in getting them ‘battle ready’. Dads and Grandads would help with this and at the same time pass on the benefits of their experience, as well as having a couple of goes themselves. Of course, the Proms just requires us to turn on our TVs but unless we join in with the singing and even get out our flags it is not quite the same is it? The Proms is about enjoying music, trying something different and it’s about joining in. So, working together, lending support, giving encouragement, having fun, passing on skills, trying something different, joining in, that sounds like a pretty good plan for the Autumn and beyond to me, what do you think?

Building upkeep and toilet extension

In July we had survey from Bensley's of the Chancel roof (internal) this was because we had found unusual debris on the floor. However it was free of charge and only involved a chap looking at the ceiling from the floor! So we think we should have a proper survey and we have requested one. On the subject of surveys, we have also commissioned a geothermal survey of that part of the north side of the churchyard that will be affected by the toilet and Tea Station extension.

This is all part of the information required by Wealden and the Diocese for the various permission/faculties.

We have received 8 second hand tables from Kent Schools refurbishment programme . They are all in good condition and will help us no end come Garden Party time and for other large events.

We hope everyone had a good summer and enjoyed the hot weather at the beginning of September. At the last Parish Council Meeting, further to requests from a number of residents, we agreed to install additional seating on the Recreation Ground. We are pleased to announce a local business and the Hooe and Sidley Football Clubs have agreed to purchase benches which we hope to have installed in the coming weeks.

There have been long standing issues with parking at both the Recreation Ground and the Village Hall, after discussion at a recent meeting the Parish Council has made an application to ESCC Highways for their views on a potential new entrance into the Recreation Ground from Straight Lane. Also, at the Recreation Ground the new water main to the Sports Pavilion is due to be connected this week commencing 11th September 2023. In August the Statutory Annual Inspections of Fire Safety Equipment and Water Safety Checks in our buildings were completed with no problems.

This summer we took receipt of two large outdoor information signs made for Jubilee Wood some time ago, which we hope to erect in the Wood in the coming months as we continue to review how to make the area a pleasant usable space for residents and visitors. We also installed two new planters, both have been filled and planted, the one outside the village hall has received a lot of positive comments.

Finally, I would like to apologise to everyone who received the unsolicited emails from a few residents who chose to use the Parish Council distribution list to circulate their personal opinions and thank you to all who have voiced their support of the Parish Council and Clerk.

At a visit to our local church I noticed that:

On the North wall inside St Mary's Church, there is a brass plaque to Cyril Charles and Norman Alfred Butler, 2 lads with a link to Ninfield. It says they drowned off the Goodwin Sands on the night 13th/14th August 1934. They were living in Ramsgate, where they had been born, although the plaque states they had been baptized in St Mary's. Their mother, Ruth Steer, had been born in Icklesham, but presumably they lived in Ninfield after the children had been born in Ramsgate. Certainly there are Steer family members in the Churchyard, and respected enough to have obtained a faculty permitting the plaque to be installed in the Church, not something easily obtained. The 1939 Register also showed a Mildred Steer living with the parents in Ramsgate, same as Ruth Butlers maiden surname.

The Background: On the evening of Monday 13th August 1934, two teenage brothers set off from Ramsgate Harbour on their fateful journey. The two lads, Norman Alfred Butler, aged 15 years and his elder brother, Cyril Charles Butler, aged 17 years, were never seen again. Census records show that both boys were born in Ramsgate, Cyril in May 1917 and Norman in January 1919. This is how the local newspaper reported the incident.....

"Coastguard stations around the Kent coast are keeping a look out for a rowing boat which left Ramsgate Harbour last night with two brothers on board and has not been seen since.. The boat is painted blue and has a blue mast. It has a lug sail. At 7pm on Monday Cyril Butler, aged 17, and his brother Norman, aged 15, put to sea in the boat.

Two young men had been landed from an Ostend fishing trawler but they were not the two brothers. The two young men, whose names were given as Ross and Tom, had left Boulogne on Monday in the yacht Comet. Having met heavy weather they attracted the attention of the Sandettie lightship off Calais and were taken on board. They remained there nearly 24 hours until the weather improved, and then hailed the trawler, which took them on board and took them, with their yacht, to Dover. Meanwhile, the fate of the two brothers remains a mystery. Have two lives been lost at sea owing to delay in the launch of the Ramsgate lifeboat? The Royal National Lifeboat Institution is making full enquiries at the port, while a sorrowing father and mother gaze out at the Goodwin Sands, which may have become the grave of their two sons."

When the two lads failed to return to harbour within a reasonable time, their father, Mr James B Butler, informed the port authorities. But, he alleges, these authorities did not give the order for the lifeboat to go out in search of the missing boys. Cyril Charles Butler, a wood carver's apprentice, was fond of sketching and oil painting. His brother Norman had been suffering with asthma. It is believed that Norman pleaded with his brother to take him out in the boat, and that Cyril was only too eager to give him a little pleasure.

Due to the dangers, the Goodwin Sands, which also includes Brake Bank, is marked by numerous light vessels and buoys. The boys left harbour in a fair wind without saying where they were going. Once it was dark and out of sight of land or any lights, they would have had no sense of direction and simply been taken by the wind. The boat was last seen under sail near the Brake light ship, off Ramsgate later the same day.

In June 1936 the tablet was dedicated in St Mary's.

Piecing the newspaper reports together, it seems they were allowed the use of a small dinghy/rowing boat with a small sail, by its owner, Mr Robert Gray. They left at 7 pm on Monday 13th August. Sunset at that time of year is at around 8pm, so only an hour of good daylight remained. They seem to have rowed to the harbour entrance as it says "they took the lug sail and mast" which suggests they used the oars whilst in the harbour before inserting the mast and raising the sail. The intention cannot have been to go for any length of time. The Brake Bank lightship is some 6 miles off Ramsgate, so to have seen and identified them as under sail, would mean they had raced that far due to the combined effect of the strong wind and tide, before nightfall. Why they didn't take refuge on the light ship?

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Fox calling

I remember commenting on a hot summers day in June, that this could be one of those years where Summer came only in June. Well I wasn't far off as I've been clumping around in wellington boots of late. As I wonder the Church yard each day, I of course keep my eyes and ears open looking for any change in the wild life that lives there. It was on one of these walks that I noticed the game keeper side of my make up going into automatic mode. We have three rabbits that are usually hopping around a hundred or so yards from the car park, I use yards as a measure as my gun only used to shoot in imperial! I have watched them for ages, they minding their own business as I mind mine. It has been quite a while since I shouldered a gun and made such a shot and I find I don't miss shooting at all. So I was quite surprised the other day when I saw them chomping on a crop, and that I was assessing 'Windage and elevation' to have a crack at them. I have also found a land drain that has been cleared of soil by a fox. The fox is more than capable of getting into a rabbit hole, or under a shed with only a few inches of ground clearance . This land drain is large and the tile pipes are over six inches in diameter. More than large enough for the fox to have her cubs there. I kept an eye on it and found many signs the fox had been there, but not to breed. It really is an odd feeling seeing all these fox signs and knowing I could catch it with ease. Its like that knowledge shouldn't really be there in my life now, it is without purpose. Having a purpose in retirement is something I struggle with; that and a body that does not respond to orders any more! Staying with the fox stories, I was at the shed at the end of the car park when a fox trotted over the field with a baby rabbit, or large rat, in its mouth. With out thinking I brought my knuckle to my mouth and sucked on the skin, making a squeak like a baby rabbit in distress. You can do this with the gun ready to shoot with the stock in your shoulder. Scent and movement are what the fox first senses. I make a strange noise nowadays having lost quite a few teeth, still it worked. The fox dropped its dinner and ran straight for me; it was only ten yards away when it sat down watching to see where the sound came from. I suppose I could have lured it even closer, but I had messed with it enough so wished it a good morning. Off it went, picking up its dinner on the run. It was a good looking fox, but I doubt it was really that wild. It was too easy to call it in and when it eventually twigged what was going on lacked any real survival instinct. But it made a nice story!

Simple but Tasty Recipes

LEMON DRIZZLE CAKE

6oz Self Raising Flour

4oz Caster Sugar

4oz Margarine

2 Eggs

4tbs Milk

Mix together until smooth and place in a lined bread tin.

45 minutes – 180C/Gas4

Topping

4oz icing sugar mixed with juice and zest of a lemon

Prick cake whilst still warm and pour over topping

BANANA CAKE

4oz Self Raising Flour

¼ tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 ripe banana

1 egg

2oz soft butter

5oz sugar

½ tsp vanilla extract

¼ tsp salt

Liquidise egg, banana, sugar, butter, vanilla and salt

Sift flour and bicarb and add to liquidised mixture

Mix to combine. Place in 7" square lined tin and bake for 25mins 190C/Gas5

APPLE CRUMBLE

8 oz flour (plain or s/r)

4 oz sugar

4oz butter

2 oz walnuts (crumbled into small pieces)

6 medium sized cooking apples

Peel and slice apples and gently cook in a little water and sugar.

Meanwhile mix flour, sugar and butter into a fine crumb, add walnuts.

When the apples are cooked and cooled a little add to dish and place the crumble mix on top.

Cook for approx. 30 minutes at 180C/Gas4 or until the crumble is slightly brown.

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Hooe History Society

2023-10

Our speaker for October is a representative from our local air ambulance. Over the past three decades they have attended over 35,000 incidents, saving lives and improving patient outcomes from the skies above Kent, Surrey and Sussex. Their achievements were spearheaded by the vision of their founder, Kate Chivers. Learn more about this emergency medical service from a member of their incredible team. We meet in St Oswald's church on Thursday 19 th October at 7.30 p.m. and as usual, refreshments will follow the talk.

DID YOU KNOW... following on from the last issue of Parish News I will try to explain a little more about the data contained in Domesday Book regarding the village of Hooe. The following information is taken from the Domesday book of Sussex (Phillimore). One regional return from Ely Abbey that survives, copies out the Commissioners' brief. It is reasonable to assume that the brief was similar across the country. They were to ask:-

The name of the place. Who held it, before 1066, and now. How many hides (or virgates) (1, 2)? How many ploughs, both those in lordship and the men's? How many villagers, cottagers and slaves, how many free men and Freemen? How much meadow, woodland and pasture? How many mills and fishponds? How much has been added or taken away? What the total value was, and is? How much each Freeman or free man had or has?

All threefold, before 1066, when King William gave it, and now; and if more can be had than at present?

(1) Hide – a land unit reckoned to be about 120 acres.

(2) Virgate – a unit of land usually understood as equalling one quarter of a hide (about 30 acres).

Sussex was divided into six North-South divisions called Rapes, which were all named from fortified centres – Chichester, Arundel, Bramber, Lewes, Pevensey and Hastings. Each Rape was placed under a magnate, a relative or trusted friend of the king, each of whom held all of the lay land in the rape. Our two local Rapes were held by the Count of Mortain (Pevensey) and the Count of Eu (Hastings). Each Rape had its own Sheriff and the Rapes were further sub-divided into areas called Hundreds. The Hastings Rape contained twelve Hundreds, one of which, the Ninfield Hundred, comprised the villages of Catsfield, Ninfield and Hooe. The other Hundreds in Hastings Rape were Baldstrow, Battle, Bexhill, Foxearle, Gostrow, Guestling, Hawkesborough, Henhurst, Netherfield, Shoyswell and Staple.

The following information has been taken from the website (opendomesday.org) which has been compiled by Anna Powell-Smith. Hooe, as a settlement had a recorded population of 73 households in 1086, putting it in the largest 20% of settlements recorded in Domesday, and is listed under 3 Tenants-in-Chief in Domesday Book– Battle Abbey, Robert Count of Eu and Robert Count of Mortain (King William’s half-brother). These powerful men were responsible for administration of the lands under their control, including the collection of taxes. There is not much known about the individual land occupants listed beneath the Tenants-in-Chief, but this website does identify the following:-

Reinbert was the Sheriff of Hastings Rape. He was associated with nil places before the Conquest; 24 afterwards.

Robert was associated with nil places before; 251 afterwards.

Osbern was associated with 22 places before; 59 afterwards.

Alfred was associated with 33 places before; 24 afterwards.

Gerald was associated with nil places before; 17 afterwards.

Ingelrann (of Eu) was associated with nil places before; just 6 afterwards.

Withbert is described as a Man-at-arms. He was associated with nil places before the Conquest and just 1, in Hooe, afterwards. Where Domesday refers to Waring, this website gives the name Werelc. He is stated as having nil places before and just 1, in Hooe, afterwards. (Another) Robert was associated with nil places before; 18 afterwards. These were almost certainly knights and barons who were rewarded for their loyalty to King William. I will try to explain further how this Feudal system of administration operated in the country in general and Hooe in particular, in the next issue of Parish News...

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Worms Eye View

Ah, October is here again. Forgive me as I look back with happy memories stemming from October 1933. Yes I was born then in Horam, known as Horeham Road in those distant days.

My dad worked in the local grocers shop so we had all the local news from him. On one occasion he came home quite excited to tell us that the King and Queen, that is George V and Queen Mary, would be driving slowly through the village the next day. This was great news and I remember a lot of us waited in the middle of Horam High Street to wave and cheer as their car slowed right down and we were all able to see them and cheer. The King actually was very poorly by this time but still smiled and waved to us.

Around this time, we, Mum, Dad and I would catch the train on nice Sundays and travel to Eastbourne in order to spend a few hours on the beach and enjoy a paddle and making sandcastles. These were happy days until one Sunday when we reached the seafront, only to find rolls and rolls of barbed wire stretched right along the beach with no access for any public to go near the sea. This was our last trip to the seaside until the end of the war.

However there was a distraction, we had three evacuees billeted with us, two girls and a boy. They were a part of a whole school from the East End of London. I was thrilled, not having any brothers or sisters; it was great to have them living with us. One of the girls, Iris, was my age and her sister Violet, three years older. Their brother Jimmy was fourteen. Their parents came down to see them several times and we enjoyed seeing them. Unfortunately as the war progressed the powers that be decided they had not been sent to one of the safest places in England, so they were all moved to Wales. We heard occasional news from them. The saddest piece was that Jimmy signed up and had joined the Navy. Tragically his ship had been sunk and all souls were lost. A happier note is that Violet always sent my parents a Christmas card and she really had been happy staying with us. My grandparents had a farm on the outskirts of Horam, which I loved visiting and which obviously gave me the love of farming which has remained with me ever since. How lucky I was to meet and marry a lovely farmer!


