Dear Friends,

For many years when I was a parish priest in Suffolk, Norfolk and then Cambridgeshire a group of us used to go Carol singing. We'd visit homes and the local pubs. Rather than asking for money for a charity or Church funds we would finish by giving out mince pies and simply wishing people Merry Christmas. This always threw people. They wanted to pay for them. We still had people hiding behind the curtains not wanting to give! They couldn't believe there wasn't some sort of catch. I'm sure it would be even worse were I to do it today. We've got so wary of scam calls, texts and emails, we are immediately suspicious of anything that seems too good to be true.

We often refer to Christ's coming at Christmas in terms of gifts. The word became flesh and dwelt among us. Unbidden and unsought, Christ comes to earth to reveal what God is like in a way that eludes human reason. The Christian story is something no one could have made up as a recipe for a restored relationship with God. But gift and the allied term grace are what it is all about.

This Christmas we are acutely aware of life's intractable problems. How on earth are we to solve the climate crisis, the economic crisis, the international relations crisis brought on by the war in Ukraine and now Israel and Palestine? All these problems seem unsolvable given normal patterns of human behaviour. How can a baby born in the backwater of an ancient empire 2000 years ago have anything to say about any of them?

But the gift of Jesus is simple without being simplistic. The heart of most problems is the problem of the human heart. Jesus offers us the gift that meets the needs we seek to fill with rapacious consumption. He offers the security that frees us to love. He offers us the peace that in trust releases generosity. He offers the forgiveness that releases us from defensiveness and

self-justification. The Gospel is good news because it meets the deepest needs of the human heart. This is where the real transformation of individuals and society is to be found. So, enjoy God's gift of Christmas, enjoy the time of rest and recuperation (if you get a chance!!) Also enjoy the pleasure of giving as well as of receiving and I may see you over Christmas at either Ninfield or Hooe Church. Merry Christmas. Paul

News from St Oswald's Church

Bonfire Lunch We had a good turnout for the Bonfire lunch on 8th November, considering the awful weather. Also, we had not held a Lunch since 2019. It was good that so many were able to attend and there was a good buzz of conversation.

The Churchyard Tidy Up was washed out on 4th November. Not an ideal date to have chosen but we tried. The new plan is, that from January 2024 there will be someone at the Church at 10.30 each Saturday morning. So, for you our volunteers, if you have an hour or so to spare on a Saturday we would be pleased to see you and explain what small jobs need doing. The weather these last few weeks has caused the lane and the churchyard to flood and the wind has blown down a lot of debris which all needs tidying. The Big Plan is that we are trying to manage the churchyard better, we want to look after and encourage wild life, plants and animals. We have approached the Wealden Bio Diversity officer for advice as to how we should go forward with this plan.

Roof Damage

In the church we have noticed debris in the chancel and the nave and investigations have shown possible beetle damage in the roof beams. This will require further investigation, treatment and added expense. It was New Year 2005 that we found an 18ft roof timber laying across the aisle just by the chancel step. We hope that this time what we find up there is not so serious.

The Armistice Service on 11th November in Church was attended by 42 people. Since we started holding this Service in 2015 the attendance has grown year by year. The Service of Remembrance on the Village Green at 3pm on Remembrance Sunday was also well attended with 50 villagers present. This service began in 2020 when Covid restrictions allowed us all to meet outside. Again, numbers have increased year by year. It seems that it is appreciated by the village and shows that the Church is serving the community.

Toilet extension

The building specification and detailed plans are to be approved by the PCC and then sent to the Diocese. We are moving forward slowly, step by step, with the hope of going out to tender in the New Year.

Worms Eye View

Christmas is coming the geese are getting fat!

Several friends and family would come and help with the plucking of the poultry and preparing them for sale, as well as the normal daily jobs of milking the cows and feeding the pigs etc. I have to admit here that I never learnt how to kill poultry, but mother-in-law was an expert and found herself doing the killing for nearly everybody else: I will add here that she only dealt with poultry! It was hard work but we enjoyed the chatter and seasonal drinks.

Back to the present, what a lot of rain we have had in October and into the beginning of November. The fields look green but oh there is so much water, it is quite difficult to get around the fields and do the looking. I have to admit that I have been stopped from doing the looking because although I was using two sticks, I still had a nasty fall, no injuries but needed help to get up. I find, like many others, old age is often annoying. Still, I can still see a lot of the farm from my many windows so I watch and enjoy the scenery.

Finally a household hint from my 1916 Farmer's Almanac: Marks made by hot dishes on a table can be removed by rubbing the spots briskly with a cloth dripped in linseed oil or sweet oil, then rubbed quickly with another cloth dipped in alcohol, then polish. (I find it much easier to use a heat proof table mat and enjoy the alcohol with my dinner)

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Hooe History Society

Hooe History Society invites members and friends to a Christmas social gathering at Catslide on Thursday 21st December to end our year. Our first meeting of 2024 will be at St Oswald's church on Thursday 18th January at 7.30 p.m. when Gary Newport will give a talk on Unsolved Mysteries. From deciphered scientific riddles to perplexing cosmic conundrums, venture into the puzzling unknowns of the universe. Embark on an exploration culminating in the realms of Dark Matter and Dark Energy where secrets await to be unveiled. Gary's talks have been well received elsewhere and we are delighted he has chosen to share his expertise with us.

DID YOU KNOW... For Hooe to be listed in the top 20% of settlements (according to population) it must have been quite an important, busy community. Certainly, the widespread salt pan industry in this area probably had a significant effect as this was a valuable preservative of foodstuffs and would have yielded a lucrative existence for the landlords. Although it is not clear what depth of water the lagoon (which is now Pevensey Level) held, the fact that there were many active salt pans suggests that the tides receded far enough to leave behind salt water that would evaporate to leave behind the precious residue. It is reasonable to assume that the inner reaches of the Pevensey lagoon were mostly navigable for smaller, shallow-draft boats, rather than larger seagoing vessels.

We cannot be certain, but this is a strong indication of how the original village of Hooe may have come to exist in what we now call the "lower end" of the village and why the church is situated in its current isolated position. Back then, the main houses we now know as Court Lodge, Grove and Halls Cross formed the basis of the village with the church at its centre. Domesday tells us that there was a small church in Hooe, but whether or not it is the same building that we see today is for others to determine. I suspect it may have been a different form of building but in a similar position.

Domesday also tells us there were 12 hides (approximately 1440 acres) in the village including pasture, arable, woodland and a mill. It also tells us the land supported 44 ploughs so it is reasonable to assume that there was significant agricultural activity alongside the salt production. The high acreage and number of ploughs seems to indicate that the village extended beyond the church and manor houses, in all probability to the

village as we know it today. Was the mill on the site where the Retreat stands today, beside the recreation ground? Possibly, but there is no conclusive evidence to support this.

We can only speculate what the village may have looked like back then based on the information that is available, but Hooe appears to have been a busy, thriving community, probably close to self-sufficient in food and almost certainly trading salt further afield. If we are to accept that Pevensey was an important trade centre at the time it is reasonable to assume that Hooe may have conducted some trade through that port whilst it existed and until the mouth of the lagoon eventually silted up centuries later. There are several roads and lanes in existence today that may have provided access to the lagoon and small boats. The privileged landowners enjoyed a comparatively wealthy lifestyle whilst the rustic population worked long, arduous hours for little reward. Conditions were harsh for everybody, as those in the higher echelons of society demanded a great deal from those below them in the pyramid. The change would come over time as the sea receded from the lagoon and the port of Pevensey, leaving the village of Hooe to develop in a different way and in a different position, along the lines of what we see today.

I did see a photo of the Church from 1970, which was nice and a story of how someone's dog barked at an unseen entity.

I am compiling a list of the bio diversity around the Church, things I have seen or heard. Perhaps I need to start another for my dog! I have to say, before we get the clergy motivated to remove said spectre, I have never felt any unease around the Church Yard. I have even been there at night listening for an owl and trying to see bats.

A more pressing concern is the protection of land to keep a sustainable level of bio diversity. Both the Church of England and Wealden Council have a bio diversity policy, both are as ethereal as St Oswald's ghost!

A likely spot to see one would be by a hedge which has a large population of small birds. It is important because the Merlin is a red flag bird, that means it is in serious decline.

On a brighter note, I have seen the first winter migrants of the year on the 6th November. A sizeable flock of Fieldfares. We have had the Hunters moon so there maybe some woodcock about. That means it's getting colder in Norway. I wonder if it will be our turn next! AT

A short story from the Bible


It can be read in the Bible in

He always did what was right so he decided to end their marriage, but quietly.




But the angel came to him in a dream.
