UR SCHOOL

Just in case you haven't noticed, we've had the workmen in during the summer and things have started to happen. Over the holiday period, with no little ones to cause Health and Safety nightmares, they managed to construct a temporary roadway and get the site securely fenced off. Inside the school building, the hall has been restored to it's former glory and is now twice the size it has been for some time. It does mean that we now have only six classrooms but at least everyone fits in comfortably for the morning assembly.

I know that the area of the building site may look very big at present, but I can assure everyone that this is not a backdoor expansion to support Wealden's plan to save the Ashdown Forest by making Ninfield 40% larger. We are simply replacing two rotting wooden huts with two bright new permanent classrooms before the woodworm finishes them off.

People have also been asking me about the Mugger! Yes, that's what I thought too, until I realised they meant the brand new Multi Use Games Area which will become a permanent fixture between the school site and the bike ramps. This area will be used as part of the playground during school times and as a village facility for the rest of the time. We will be working closely with the Parish Council to see how best we can all use this. Anyone for Tennis?

I'VE BEEN THINKING AGAIN - BY MM

I bought my first car when I was 21. It was normal then to save for such things, it never occurred to me to have a bank loan. The car was a Singer Chamois (a posh version of the Hillman Imp). It was rear-engined with the boot under the bonnet. Then it suddenly occurred to me that I could not even change a wheel. What would I do if I had a puncture?

So, I enrolled for Car Maintenance Classes at Claverham College, Battle. I attended for 4 years. It wasn't just changing plugs and points, we learned to renew brake shoes, grind-in valves etc., working on each other's cars. I only went to a garage for a MOT test. I bought a huge workshop manual and drew up a proper maintenance schedule. I even learned the chassis and engine numbers for when I bought parts!

The Chamois had a highly tuned little engine that needed frequent adjustment. I treated myself to a strobe timing light which helped. I had all the gear-ramps, axle stand and an impressive collection of spanners – all 'AF' in those days, no metric. I've loved working on my various cars, I even love the smell of the differential oil when I crawled underneath for a top up!!

I sometimes pushed myself to the limits of my knowledge and strength. I remember when the Chamois' thermostat seized open. To fit a new one, I had to work from inside the car after removing a plate behind the rear seat. Space was limited and I kept banging my hand against the sharp metal gap. I was smothered in little cuts! (it was even worse than when I helped my sister change the fan-belt on her Mini!)

With another car I replaced the backplates as the previous owner had worn the adjusters. I didn't want to drain all the brake fluid, so I covered the filler-tube with Cling Film (just invented) and replaced the cap. It worked! I still had to bleed it though.

I loved working on my cars, but oh, did I suffer when I "bit off more than I could chew"!

HRISTIAN WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP Our return to our monthly get togethers kicked off in September with a talk by Ben Pratt on 'Bee Keeping'. He and his wife have made a flourishing business from their hobby and he was able to display lots of their own produce (with the help of the bees, of course!), to include candles, wax polish, honey marmalade, honey comb, fudge and many flavours of the natural product. He also sells equipment at their home in Polegate to keep the enthusiast protected and the bees happy.

Honey bees exist to pollinate. And without them more than one quarter of our food would not grow. They are busy doing their job from the first May blossom to the brambles and the ivy in Autumn. Not the Queen though...she has a rather spoilt life of being groomed and fed up with bee milk and Royal Jelly until she is nearly twice the size of an ordinary worker. Then when she is about 10 days old the workers (other females) escort her out of the hive to find a drone (males) congregation away from her own hive (for genetic diversity) and can mate with 14 drones on the wing, subsequently laying 1,500/2000 eggs! It was a fascinating talk and really, about the most essential member of the food chain. The Romans took honey to war for use as an antiseptic. And jars were found in Egyptian tombs...still edible!

There was so much more to know about bees that the time went very quickly. Thank you Ben for your visit.

The summer has been busy for the Parish Councillors starting with the hub at the carnival giving villagers the opportunity to come and ask questions and find out what's happening in the village. There is no full council meeting in August but the cllrs still had planning applications to consider and of course lots of reading with the publication of the new draft Wealden Local Plan. The cllrs are currently going through the plan in order to make representations ahead of the 8th October deadline. We would urge residents to also comment on the plan. This month's meeting kicked off with a guest speaker from Action in Rural Sussex who had come to explain more about what is involved in developing a neighbourhood plan for the village. The talk was really informative and we learnt that there is a lot to consider, it's a real whole community project and would require the recruitment of volunteers. The cllrs will be discussing this more over the coming months.

The school project has started over the summer. There will be two new classrooms built to replace the two in the old huts as well as a Multi use Games Area for the school to use during the school day and for the village to use out of school hours. The construction company have worked hard over the summer to make sure that the school was ready to welcome the children back in September with a new access into the school, fenced walk ways and most importantly a viewing platform so that the children can keep an eye on what's happening at their school. The site manager is very approachable and more than happy to talk to residents and answer questions.

The next few weeks will be very busy with planning applications requiring comments and writing a response to the Wealden Local Plan. If you would like to keep up to date in between meetings please follow our Facebook page Ninfield Parish Council.

The Chair informed the meeting that the Revd Peter Doodes has resigned as a Councillor due to increased commitments with other aspects of his work in the community. Peter has served as Councillor for many years, in that time has been involved with many community issues including the establishment and organisation of the village allotments. His most recent work has been concerned with the proposed project of building a new village hall in Hooe. The Chair was pleased to inform the meeting that Peter would still be involved with this project. A vote of thanks was made for all the sterling work Peter undertook in his role as Councillor which was reinforced by all those present at the meeting.

The parish Council has recently had two vacancies to fill. Jo Dix and Ross Clifton were co-opted at the meeting as Councillors. The Chairman looks forward to working with them in the future.

Rev Doodes had been Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council so another Vice-Chairman will need to be elected. It was decided that this election should take place at the next meeting when all Councillors are present. In the meantime Councillor Robert Pilbeam agreed to take on this role on a temporary basis.

Southern Water reported that they are still planning their revised project at Hooe Water Treatment Works with their construction partner and should be in a position to provide a more comprehensive update at the end of October. OOE HISTORY SOCIETY

The History Society met as planned for their Summer Outing on Thursday 16th August. It had been a wet, miserable day and one wondered how we would get on, walking approximately one mile along Pett Level beach.

We were lucky, about an hour before the walk began, the skies cleared and the sun shone, shimmering on the sea as the tide went out, a perfect evening.

Twenty nine members and fiends arrived and we first listened to our leader for the evening, Mr Ken Brooks warned us not to go too near the cliffs, in case of sudden rock falls. It is advisable to stay away at the same distance as the height of the cliffs. He then showed us models of dinosaur toe and footprints that we might find. He also explained that there had been a forest where the beach now is, obviously where these extinct reptiles had roamed. When the tide goes right out, remains of the old trees can be seen, preserved as wood and not petrified into stone. And so as we set off, poking and peering with sudden shouts of exciting finds, drawing us together as we listened to Ken identifying the discoveries to us. The time passed very quickly with the lovely background of the sandstone cliffs in the evening sunshine, interesting themselves with the fault visible where the cliffs had been compressed,

It really was a super outing, enjoyed by both young and old, with eager anticipation of another talk by Mr Brooks next year.

By the time you read this, Sam Langley will have given us an illustrated tour of the interesting and unusual features that make Bexhill such a fascinating place, including hidden corners that even those of you with a good knowledge of the town did not know about.

Norman Franks will visit us on Thursday 18th October with a talk entitled World War 1 – The Air War. His talk will cover the development of both the aeroplane as a war machine, guns and armament in the area, the airmen and how they fought in this new third dimension. It will focus on how a recent invention, the flimsy aircraft, very quickly became essential to our success in the war and on the ground. It should be an interesting insight into the beginnings of the RAF in this, its centenary year.

DID YOU KNOW that on the 25th January 1798 John Jones, an Officer of Excise aged 31, was buried in Hooe churchyard. He does not appear to have been an inhabitant of Hooe as the village was almost entirely based around agriculture and he does not feature in the church birth or marriage records. This was the era when the Hooe smuggling gang was still very strong and the Excise was based in the larger towns — Hastings, Eastbourne, Battle. Is it possible this man may have been killed in a skirmish with smugglers? If so, why was he not recovered by the authorities for burial elsewhere? As yet, this remains a mystery, although the ghost of an Excise officer is said to walk the Red Lion...
