Dear Friends,

As a member of the Governing body of Ninfield School I take a keen interest in education and in the upbringing of our children. Education is very much part of the political agenda and our school as well as many others find it very difficult to manage the budget with so many cutbacks year upon year. I am amazed at what our small school manages to achieve in spite of these cutbacks and the recent Ofsted inspection proves the point. However, the upbringing of our children is not just the responsibility of the school but parents as well and as a church school we also take a keen interest in the children's progression. I thoroughly enjoy the special services the school hold in St Mary's, I only wish we had a bigger church to get more parents in!

Apart from education, one topic that has been in the news recently is mental health and how our children can be affected just as much as adults. Our children are sadly part of a society that now seems to cram more and more pressures upon our young people. There are more and more tests and exams which create more and more stress. Unfortunately, governments seem to judge our schools by academic achievement and scores rather than by wellbeing and self-worth! On top of this, our children are constantly bombarded by social media where their very being is being moulded by what they see online, so much so that children are paying the price and one result is that self-harming, mental health problems and death rates continue to soar!

As a result, we in the church need to be more alert to mental health in our congregation and indeed promote mental health in our wider community.

I am sure like me; you sometimes say to someone how are you today! It's just a passing thing often said but do we expect an honest answer! How would we cope if they said "Well actually ..." Sometimes we need to be able to give people time, a precious commodity these days, but time is something we all have, and it may well help someone more than we realise! Whether we are looking at physical or mental health some things cannot be seen! Some supermarkets now have signs on the disabled toilet reminding us that not all disabilities

are visible! So next time we ask someone how they are, may it not just be a passing remark but a genuine concern for the others well being and if we are asked the same question of ourselves let's not be afraid to answer it truthfully.

One important part about being a Christian is that we are genuinely concerned about people as we reflect God's concern about all his creation. So can I wish us all a healthy and uplifting summer as sunshine often helps us in feeling good about ourselves and if we are not feeling good then talk to someone!

OOE HISTORY SOCIETY

Our thanks to Ken Brookes with his interesting talk in May, entitled Beside the Seaside, looking at the emergence of seaside holidays, entertainment and other activities through the 19th century and into the 1950's, with particular reference to our own area. Ken's enthusiasm for the local coastline shone through, as ever.

Our next speaker, on Thursday 20th June is Terry Whippy with WW2 Memories of a Close Relative. Terry and his colleague, Richard, have between them a great deal of knowledge and items from the Second World War. Terry will be doing the talking and Richard is always keen to display some of the hundreds of items of memorabilia he has collected about the war, many from the battlefield.

DID YOU KNOW ... That the Hooe primary school which closed in 1963 was probably built at some time between 1849 and 1851, after the plot of land on which it stands was donated by Sir Peregrine Palmer Fuller Palmer Acland with a Voluntary Grant dated the 4th August, 1846 to the Archdeacon of Lewes and the Vicar and Churchwardens of Hooe (trustees of school). On its closure, the building was sold by the Diocesan Authority and is now a private house, next to Sandhall Farm. There was also a second school, "the Dames' School", in the village which ran for a short time between July 1871 and October 1873, although it is not clear where it stood.

Earlier, in September 1793, there was also a single advertisement in the Sussex Weekly Advertiser, which read, "Mrs. Croft and Co. beg leave to inform the Public that they have opened a French and English Boarding School for Young Ladies, in the village of Hooe, in the county of Sussex, where they teach the basics of plain and all sorts of fashionable works, drawing, in its various branches, writing and arithmetic, at the terms as follow: Young Ladies from four to ten years of age, Ten Guineas per annum; all above ten years, Twelve Guineas. No Entrance. N. B. The strictest care and attention will be paid to the morals of the young Ladies." Did it ever open? If so, where in the village? Why was it planned for Hooe and not one of the larger towns? Answers on a postcard please....

SPICED HONEY DRIZZLE CAKE

100g salted butter 100g light brown soft sugar

100g runny honey 1 large egg

100ml milk 1 tsp mixed spice

½ tsp ground ginger 150g self-raising flour

For the glaze

25g salted butter 25g runny honey

Warm oven to 180C/160C fan/Gas 4. Butter and line a 900g loaf tin with baking parchment. Beat the butter and sugar until creamy. Whisk in the honey, egg, milk, spices and a pinch of salt then fold in the flour. Tip into tin and bake for 45 minutes. Leave to cool for 10 minutes then turn onto a wire tray.

For the glaze – melt the butter and honey until smooth, leave to cool until thickened. Then drizzle over the cake and leave to set. Enjoy.

OOE OPEN GROUP

The ladies met on Friday afternoon the 10th May, to hear a talk on the encounter with Polar Bears, while exploring the Artic Region. Unfortunately the speaker fell ill with a very sore throat and a substitute had to be found.

The person who came to the rescue was no-other than Edna Wallis's husband David, who gave a talk on the City of London and the Livery (Trade Guilds) in particular.

David and his wife Edna, both have the honour of being Freeman of the City of London, Respectively Free of the Company of Scientific Instrument Makers and Free of the Spectacle Makers Company.

They served the City from 1995 to 1996 and had a very wonderful time in office. There were many social occasions, culminating in the annual banquet at the Mansion House, when the Lord Mayor and his Lady were their guests.

David displayed some of their memorabilia, including invitations to Civic dinners and luncheons, including the invitation from HM the Queen inviting them to her Garden Party at Buckingham Palace.

David also outlined the contribution that the City of London makes to the rest of the country and the economy in general and with international development in particular. It is amazing that the London Foreign Exchange Market deals with over one Trillion pounds (1,000,000,000,000) per day in foreign exchange.

As usual the meeting drew to a happy conclusion with tea and chat.

It cannot be ignored in this June edition, that 75 years ago, East Sussex was bulging at the seams with men and equipment being amassed for the imminent invasion of Europe. The Dieppe Raid in 1942 had shown that French ports would be grimly defended by the Germans, and therefore a different tactic had to be devised.

Key to this was the construction of vast concrete floating blocks that could be sunk in a sequence, to provide breakwaters and a safe anchorage for the troop landing ships and supplies. There were two Mulberry harbours, one for the Americans and one for the Allies, British, Canadian, Poles, Free French etc.

Before that, the Allies had to win air superiority, starting with damaging attacks on oilfields in central Europe at Ploesti, and daylight fighter sweeps to tempt the Luftwaffe to give combat. Added to that were the American daylight raids where the P47 Mustang began to prove its ability to fly all the way to the targets escorting the bombers and dealing effectively with any enemy fighters.

Bomber Command were switched to attacking Lines of Communications, rail depots, freight yards and road and water choke points such as bridges. The concept was to prevent any reinforcements being able to easily access and attack the bridgehead. Initial gains were made, despite some heavy casualties particularly in the American sector, but progress was slowed in the deep lanes and thick hedgerows of the Normandy bocage. Caen was expected to fall within a few days but took over a month by which time it had been bombed to destruction.

But back in Ninfield, all was suddenly quiet, no troops marching to and fro, no convoys of lorries choking the lanes - until a week later when the air reverberated to an unusual rasping sound as the first waves of V1 pilotless buzz bombs headed to London. At 400 mph they were faster than most fighter aircraft, only the very latest Hawker Tempest could catch them in level flight, others had to dive from height to try and get within range. Machine gun bullets would often simply bounce off, and added to the problem, anti-aircraft batteries would keep on firing.

Two V1's are known to have fallen close to Ninfield. One was in

the field just short of Church Wood and there is a photo of men sitting in impact craters, so it seems to have exploded before hitting the ground in one piece. The other was behind the Memorial Hall, near to the Christmas Tree Farm land. This V1 exploded with sufficient force to damage the Memorial Hall roof. Negotiations with the Ministry for Reparation of War Damage dragged on well into the 1950's! This is why the Hall has a smooth roof and mansard windows, rather than the roof lights which previously extended all along the roof.

Built in 1862/3, it's not surprising that with such a hard life the Hall is in need of major restoration to bring Victorian building to be fit for use not only for now but well into the future! It is also important as being the OLDEST surviving Cinque Ports Artillery Volunteers Drill Shed (as barracks were then called). It was a "Positioning Battery" positioned a little inland than the Martello Towers which were designed to hold up any invader on the beaches, so that the positioning batteries could come to their aid.

Worms Eye View

I am writing this a little early for June, but if I don't do it now a busy time lies ahead. So just to recap for a moment: I must tell you it was a good lambing this year. The good weather helped so much it meant that the ewes and their new lambs could go out onto the grass very quickly, which is good for them and a great help to us and for me good exercise each day to do the lookering.

This year the badgers have been very busy digging out fresh holes, one has to be very careful not to get a foot stuck. One lamb, obviously rather curious, got firmly stuck in one and was pleased to be released!

Of course walking around one sees much more wildlife than just sheep and cattle. It has been good to see a fresh pair of swans take up residence on the farm after both of the adult swans who had regularly visited us over the last few years died. They were a good age and it was lovely to see them gliding along on the water with their babies following, often in a straight line. I hope the new family follow suit. We also have several wild duck nesting and this morning a mum sailed past me with 4 babies trying to keep up with her.

Now it isn't unusual to see a pheasant around, usually a cock. They show off much more than the females (no comment!). However I am not sure how many there are because I can be walking quietly along when suddenly a flurry of foliage and a cock pheasant flies up in front of me, cackling. Whew, that makes me jump and when after travelling on quite a bit it happens again, is it a different pheasant or the same one getting pleasure from seeing me jump?

Weather wise it us said that sheep can forecast bad weather. If the older sheep stand with their backs to the wind and stay motionless for a long time, it means a lot of rain is on its way. However if we are due for more than rain the young sheep tend to get frisky and start playing about, jumping up and down and butting one another and that means a storm and very bad weather is coming.

Let's hope they all keep calm and we have a glorious June






