An Easter Journey

Dear Friends

Each Easter we are invited to go on a journey with Jesus from his entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to his resurrection on Easter Sunday. As we listen to the Easter Story; reflect on it; and pray our way through it, we may find that a particular aspect of the Easter Story resonates with us now. As we enter into His story, we find connections between His story and our story.

We make this journey in different ways. We make this journey through our own prayers and reading the Bible. It will be our personal journey. We make our journey with Jesus at the Stations of the Cross service at Hooe at 11am on Good Friday and we have a more reflective service at Ninfield at 2pm.

On Easter Day, the Easter Candle is lit and then we carry the light into church. This leads into a Holy Communion service which is a real family celebration of Easter. The joy of the Easter event is part of our celebration so please join us either at 9.30 in Ninfield or 11am at Hooe. You will find a warm welcome.

A journey has a beginning and an end as we arrive at our destination. For us as Christians what we do along that journey is very important and very personal. Sometimes we can plan that journey, sometimes events take us in different directions. Whatever our journey, we do not do it on our own, as Jesus walks with us if we ask him to.

This Easter, our hearts are crying out to God for the people of Ukraine in their suffering after a year of war. We are crying out for an end to the violence. We are deeply disturbed by what the invasion of Ukraine means for the peace and stability of the world. Of course, we can pray anywhere at any time, but the important thing is that we pray, thanking God for his love shown at Easter but also praying for peace.

News from St Oswald's

The Repairs to the church have been completed which ends another busy year at St Oswald's. Plans are in place for the improvement of the lighting and the big project the building of an extension for a toilet and tea station. This will take time as we have to follow guidance from the Diocese and Wealden District Council.

The church is in good order as is the churchyard, which at present has a vast covering of snowdrops, harbouring the arrival of the more spring flowers in our Natural Churchyard.

Thanks to those who have already supported our Lent collection for the Food Bank. We have received a Certificate thanking us for donating 137.20kg of food during 2022.

In April we start a new church year with the election of Churchwardens and other members of the PCC. The PCC (Parochial Church Council, not to be confused with the Parish Council) deal with the day to day running and care of the church. The Churchwardens are elected annually and the other members serve a 3 year term.

The APCM (Annual Parish Church Meeting) will be held after the 11.00 am Service on Sunday 16th April. Villagers are able to vote for the Church Wardens. The APCM is made up of 2 meetings.

The first is the Vestry Meeting to elect the Church Wardens. Any Parishioner can attend and vote.

The second is the Annual meeting where reports are presented and the Financial Statement is explained and approved, new members are elected on to the PCC. The Annual Report and Financial Statement are discussed and after questions a vote is taken to accept them.

Only members on the Church Electoral Roll are allowed to vote at this meeting.

The new PCC will then meet to discuss plans for the coming year.

We are continuing our support of Bexhill Food Bank and will be nominating the First Sunday of the month as the day we will be inviting people to donate items of food.

In 2022 we managed to donate 137.20 kgs of food. We would like to beat that total this year.

Planning & Environment (we are statutory consultees on all Planning Applications within the Parish – although the decision on approval or refusal is made by Wealden District Council.)

For the first time this May voters will need an accepted form of ID in order to cast their vote. These include a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth Passport; a UK, EEA or Commonwealth drivers licence and some concessionary travel passes such as an older persons bus pass or an Oyster 60 + card (visit the Electoral Commission's website for a full list of accepted ID and more information about this new requirement. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo. Anybody who doesn't have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free online from Monday 16th January at https://voter-authoritycertificate.service.gov.uk or by completing a paper form. Hooe History Society

Our April meeting will feature a new speaker to us, Graham Bandy, who will give a talk on Military Nursing. Graham has spent most of his life in the army, nursing, or both. He has been collecting military badges and ephemera since he was at school, and is now a much sought after asset at both county and national family history fairs, such as Who Do You Think You Are Live and Family Tree Live and has appeared on BBC's WDYTYA. Graham also gives many talks and lectures on the subject of badge and photographic identification and military history. He sits on the Heritage Committee of the QARANC (Queen Alexandra's Royal Nursing Corps) Association. We meet on Thursday 20th April at 7.30 p.m. in St Oswald's Church. Refreshments will be available, as usual, after the talk.

DID YOU KNOW... we are very grateful for the care and attention we receive today in our local hospitals through the NHS, all of which is financed through our taxes, but do we ever stop to think how these services were run a hundred years ago? Here is an edited report from the Bexhill Chronicle from July 1906 describing how our predecessors in these villages helped to fund the early hospitals.

That the villagers of Hooe, Ninfield and Catsfield are fully alive to their privileges and responsibilities in connection with the East Sussex Hospital was amply demonstrated on Sunday, when, for the second year, the day was set apart for the purposes of a Hospital Sunday. All denominations in the little community, with representatives of the various friendly societies in the district combined to make the event a complete success, and that their end was accomplished none who were present will deny.

The proceedings were timed to commence at 1.30 p.m. and at that hour Hooe Common was quite animated with the gaily dressed inhabitants, who were attired in a manner suitable to the occasion. The old-fashioned smocks of the venerable Ninfield Friendly Society showed up in striking contrast to the more modern apparel and brilliant insignia of the younger institutions. Green mingled with red, and red with gold and blue, while over the heads of the "knights,"primos, worthy masters, chief rangers and the rank and file of the brotherhood floated two gorgeous banners, a pair of tri-coloured flags, and the blue ensign of the Ninfield Friendly Society. The scene was reminiscent of the accounts of the doings of one's grandparents seventy years ago, and it was indeed set amid the most favourable surroundings.

The weather was ideal, and more than one of the processionists found it difficult to believe the month of October had been commenced. At the head

of the procession marched the Ninfield Band and the various societies took up the following order: Ninfield Friendly Society, Hooe Friendly Society, Catsfield Friendly Society, Hooe Drum and Fife Band, Battle Fire Brigade, Ninfield Foresters, Herstmonceux Brass Band, Oddfellows Friendly Society, Ninfield R.A.O.B., the Battle Brass Band, the Ninfield Agency of the Equitable Friendly Society, and the Ninfield Branch of the National Deposit Friendly Society...

...The Catsfield societies joined en route at Ninfield and additions were made to the Fire Brigade at Catsfield. The route taken by the procession was as follows: Hooe Common to Ninfield, Ninfield to Catsfield (via Catsfield Stream) Church Road, Catsfield, by Wesleyan Chapel to top of Catsfield Green, Skinner's Lane, Marl Pits, Moon's Hill, Manchester Road, Bexhill Road to a field for service.

The afternoon, until past four o'clock, was taken up in parading the roads of the villages, and all along the route busy collectors gave the spectators little rest. About 4.15 the head of the procession entered Mr Hobden's field at Ninfield, where a space had been roped off for the accommodation of the bands and the waggon from which the service of the afternoon was to be conducted.

The Rev. E. Mortlock, who addressed the gathering as "My brethren of the Ninfield, Catsfield and Hooe Hospital Committee, and my brethren, too, of the friendly societies,"... gave an address complimenting the medical staff then ...gave an instance in which a resident in that immediate neighbourhood was admitted to the East Sussex Hospital as an urgent case, and then told how highly all the patients spoke of the treatment they received in that institution...

...During the singing of the hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers," a collection was taken, and the proceedings terminated with the Benediction... The secretarial duties were entrusted to the capable hands of Mr. J. Ridel. The net result of the Committee's efforts amounted to £20.

Note: According to CPI inflation calculator, this would be worth about £3,111 today. Peter Hayward.

I had spent all morning in the rain and mud so gave the appearance of a weather beaten Gnome. It was hard to concentrate, she is a very attractive lady and I desperately wanted to avoid losing some of my lunch in my beard. Still my battle plan worked, 'I know nothing, please help'!

Slow-cooked pork, cider & sage hotpot

4 tbsp olive oil, plus a little extra
1kg diced pork shoulder
20g butter, cubed, plus a little extra
4 leeks, trimmed and thickly sliced
4 garlic cloves, crushed
3 tbsp plain flour
500ml dry cider
400ml chicken stock
2 bay leaves
½ small bunch parsley, finely chopped
small bunch sage, leaves picked, 5 left whole, the rest chopped
200ml single cream
400g Maris Piper or King Edward potatoes
400g sweet potatoes

Method

Heat half of the oil in a deep ovenproof frying pan, or

flameproof casserole dish, and fry the pork pieces over a medium high heat in batches until seared all over, then transfer to a plate.

Add another 1 tbsp oil to the pan with a little butter and fry half the leeks with a pinch of salt for 10 mins until tender.

Add the garlic, fry for a minute, then stir in the flour.

Pour in the cider, a little at a time, stirring to pick up any bits stuck to the bottom of the pan and to combine everything.

Add the stock, bay leaves and seared pork, then simmer, half-covered with a lid for $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs until the meat is just tender (it will later cook to the point of falling apart in the oven). Can be prepared a day ahead.

Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Simmer uncovered for a few minutes to reduce the sauce, if you need to – it shouldn't be too liquid or the potatoes will sink into the sauce. Stir in the parsley, chopped sage, remaining leeks, and the cream, then season well.

Peel both types of potatoes and cut into slices 2mm thick. Alternate layers of potato and sweet potato in circles over the pie. Dot the cubed butter over the top and bake for $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs until the potato is tender. Nestle in the whole sage leaves, brushed in a little oil, for the last 10 mins.

Leave to rest for 10 mins before serving.

Sow French beans under glass, sow peas and keep sowing at regular intervals (and a tip from Carol Klein - cover with holly sprigs to keep the mice away!) and most importantly - attend the plant market on 22nd April

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Part 4 (continued from last month)

A new Workhouse was built at Hellingly to gather them all the poor together. The site was where the roundabout on the A271 meets the road to Hailsham, opposite the petrol station. But the Workhouse principle of breaking up families remained and the shame is the main reason why the workhouse was so feared. You only went there in desperation when all other avenues had been exhausted, even prostitution being preferred. That inevitably meant only the worst of the worst ended up there, giving "good" cause for the resentment of the rest of the population who had to pay for their keep.

It's estimated that between 1831 to 1834 the annual expenditure on poor relief had been £18,351 being £1 and 11 shillings per head of population (that's everyone, children included) and when you consider that families of up to 10 were common, including aged parents and grandparents, that was a costly burden for each family. A system therefore developed of "outworking" so that when labour as needed on farms etc, paupers would be sent on a temporary basis. When not required, they were simply thrown back into the Workhouse, a completely unsatisfactory way of coping, as each time the poor diet and onerous conditions affected even the healthy the most.

It was also a completely unachievable aim to make conditions "worse" than outside! Nearly all agricultural labourers lived a subsistence lifestyle, so to make it worse would actually require starvation rations, and even the worst Commissioners couldn't stoop to that level. But having "idle" people was undesirable, especially for those that wanted to work but simply couldn't find it in the area they were. And they couldn't move to find work, they had to find work to be able to move away, and that was impossible when you had no money and no way of travelling far. It did at least provide shelter, food, warmth and rudimentary care, but often the conditions were little better than prison.

By 1777, there were Workhouses established at Hooe (30 places); Ninfield (15 places); Herstmonceux (45 places) and Wartling (40 places). In part, the higher the number of places the probability was of more "seasonal" agricultural work, as often workers were unable to gain an income once the harvest was over, until the next spring required more workers for ploughing and planting. A highly unsatisfactory system, leaving people unable to find secure long term employment or improve their condition. Some workhouses had punishment regimes that equalled or surpassed those for slaves in plantations, being forbidden to wear shirts, just waistcoats, heads shaved and whipping for minor infringements.

An example of how people were treated is: April 13 1848: *Gilead Streeter,* of St Mary Magdalen Hastings: aged 48; was married at Sedlescombe on 15 Apr 1820 to William Streeter of Ninfield, who died on 21 Dec 1842. in 1822 William Streeter (WS) was committed for three months to prison for poaching. During that time she received poor relief for herself and her husbands illegitimate child, and after those three months WS was sent on board a Man 'o War for two years. In 1833 they moved from Ninfield to Hastings and in Aug 1836 she and her two children were removed from St Mary Magdalen to Ninfield and placed in the workhouse at Hellingly; child Phoebe Elizabeth (13 years). Statement by Henry Coussins of All Saints, relieving officer for St Mary Magdalene, Hastings.

There was some attempt to attract people into indentures, where they would be apprenticed for at least a year with just bed and board, or there were moves to transport some overseas as labour to be released from contracts of bondage in a specified time period. In this way, it was not just convicts that were transported although often hard to distinguish between the groups, except where families could be sent together.

Even in the last century such old fashioned customs existed. Correspondence relating to the investment of £250 received from the trustees of Lord Brassey for the enfranchisement of eight freehold tenements of the manor of Moorhall in Ninfield. Date: Mar - Apr 1921. ESRO reference: ACC 11252/4/8: William Augustus Raper writes that he still has sufficient money from the redemption of heriots seized on Brassey's death to pay for the fence at the Workhouse Farm, 1 March 1921. Heriot was the right of a lord to seize a serf's best property, animals etc upon his death. It arose from the tradition of the lord and by extension, the King, who "paid" for his nobles to be well armed and armoured, the better to protect him in battle. Heriot is one of the many curious laws from feudal times that started because of a logical need between two parties. It was legally abolished in Britain in 1922.

Had the Brassey Estate waited one more year and no heriot would have been due! It's also likely that the "eight tenements" referred to would be properties in Manchester Road, as those were held as Church Tenements by the Worrall and Fuller Exhibition Fund, a charity run by St Giles, Cripplegate, London, hence why Church Farm is there, NOT by St Marys. Eventually the Workhouses would be assimilated into the National Health Service, completing the cycle from "hospitals" in the mediaeval sense of shelter to the hospitals for medicine we have today Kevin Regan NINFIELD METHODIST CHURCH Minister: Reverend Crawford J.
