Dear Friends.

At last, this year it looks as though we can celebrate Christmas in Church!! The Christmas Season is quickly coming upon us – it must be so because Christmas cards have been available since September, tinsel and lights have been adorning the shops and public spaces for a while now, and the John Lewis advert has just been released! Seriously, for some – and for me not too many years back – these are the signs that it's 'all systems go' on the countdown to Christmas, Ho, Ho, Ho....

But are these the only signs that point the way to Christmas Day? Surely not... - Say a prayer for those in need of comfort, strength and hope at this time as they experience illness or caring for someone who is poorly, those who are mourning or who are struggling with life...
- Help out with a local charity who are trying to make Christmas a brighter time for the homeless or the lonely...
- Have a thought 'Are my neighbours okay?' Is there anyone
 who might be lonely or unable to engage socially or
 practically in your road and who might be touched by a

However the primary cause of the holes is down to badgers which as you know are a protected species. We have put a sign up regarding the uneven ground and would ask anyone visiting the graves of friends or relatives to be particularly careful when crossing the grass. This is more relevant in the winter when the ground tends to be wet or frozen.

NEWS FROM ST. OSWALD'S.

BELL RESTORATION PROJECT

We recently received the good news that the gift from Alan Collings was included in a Codicil to his Will as a legacy of £40,000 to St. Oswald's Church with no restrictions. Those individual local donors had who been so generous have been offered a repayment and the Sussex Churches Bell Restoration Fund have been advised that we will not be claiming their pledged grant. In deference to the family's and our loyal band of bellringers' request we will not be adding a 6th bell to the existing ring of five. Any balance in funds will be put towards the cost of renovating the ruined shed to provide a loo and washing facilities for the church. Alan's gifts will be acknowledged in the Bell tower.

The work of removing the five bells and all fittings was completed this week and we now wait to hear when the Bellhangers will return the newly tuned and refurbished bells, to carry out the strengthening of the bell frame and install a new lower rope guide.

SERVICE

Our annual Armistice Day Service was attended by 24 people and had the added benefit this year of an organist, Paul Abnett who played Nimrod (beautifully) before the Service. Wreaths were laid by Dick Carey for Parish Council and Simon Pattisson for Parochial Church Council.

BUILDING

A group from the Diocesan Advisory Council have arranged a visit shortly to look at our ideas for renovating the shed to provide toilet facilities and this will help us to avoid possible pitfalls when applying for Faculty or Planning permissions. Our inspecting architect has drawn up a schedule of minor works and this is now out to tender

CAROL SERVICE

Wednesday 15th December at 7.00pm, with the Hooe Village Band. Everyone is welcome. There will be a bus travelling from the Red Lion Car Park, we hope it will make 3 trips, 1st at 6.15pm, 2nd 6.30 3rd 6.45 (all approximate times). The bus will do the reverse route at the end of the service, another 3 trips. Since the last Carol Service two years ago, there are a number of new families in the Village so here are some helpful tips. It is a popular event, parking is limited. Please car share where possible. Our Volunteers will be there to help and direct you. The traffic will be monitored to allow the bus to drop off and return. You may have to wait to allow the bus time to turn around safely. If you can arrive on foot that will be a great help, but do wear stout footwear and bring torches. Please arrive early if you

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HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

As we look back on 2021 it is fair to say that it has been a fairly challenging year. We managed to start to re-convene our meetings in September, since when our attendances have slowly increased. At the time of writing we are considering an in-house gathering with nibbles for December and our speaker in January next year is to be Alexis Markwick with a talk entitled Bexhill Mapping in a Digital Age. Those who have heard this talk have said it is a really interesting one, so we are looking forward to a fine start to the year. At the time of writing, we have still to confirm our programme of speakers for next year.

DID YOU KNOW... this month is the summary on the Tithe sales that I have described in the previous two issues. Here is the information from the Electoral Register, an eye witness account and, in the interest of impartiality, an alternative view.

Peter Hayward comment – The electoral register for 1932 at the East Sussex Records Office (The Keep) at Falmer lists two sets of inhabitants at Sadlers Farm – Percival and Annie Morris and James and Winnie Luck. Dick Carey has told me that the end of the farmhouse nearest the village was at one time a self-contained cottage, which would explain why two families were housed at the same address. I suspect that the landowners in this case may have been the Morrises as this family owned the farm until fairly recently.

The owners of Broad Green Farm are more difficult to establish as the farm is not listed as such in the same electoral register. Archie and Lily Hoad are listed at Eatons Farm, but that is on the opposite side of the road. Albert and Sarah Mitchell are listed as living in Broad Street as are Herbert and Lily Sheather, but I am unable to ascertain for sure who may have been the relevant landowners.

* * *

Mog Ballard, in writing down some of his own memories of the village a few years ago, gave this account — "I was witness to what was the last Tithe demonstration in the area. The site was in the field next to Sadlers Farm and must have concerned the owner of that farm. I was a young boy of ten at that time and was wondering what all the excitement was about when this poor chap was chased down the road followed by a very angry crowd of people, fortunately finding refuge in the Red Lion. I must say I was very frightened and thought the crowd were going to kill him!"

Of course, there are always two sides to a story and the following week this letter was printed in the Bexhill Observer:-

Sir,—As I formerly collected the Vicar's tithe in Hooe, I feel I must, in justice, correct the statement that was made on a card exhibited at the abortive tithe sale held in Hooe last week: "Lord St. Audries, approximately £600 a year for nothing. The parson £300 a year. Total, £900, all out of about 20 farmers at Hooe. Is it fair?"

Actually, less than two-thirds of the vicarial tithe is due from farmers living in Hooe, while over one-third is due, chiefly on marshland, from non-resident owners, and the small remainder is due from residents who are not farmers. Whatever Lord St. Audries' tithe may be, it appears that he, as well as other tithe owners, never gets the whole of it, and it should be recognised that recently he paid for very extensive repairs and decorations to the chancel of Hooe Church, which action refutes the statement "for nothing".

Thus ended another chapter in the story of the East Sussex farmers' revolt against what they consider the "iniquitous (unjust) robbery" of the tithe system.

Picture from The Sphere newspaper:- (Caption) Furious Farmers created a scene at two tithe distraint sales at Hooe, Sussex, at one of which an effigy of Lord St. Audries was burned at the stake. The auctioneer is seen getting away from the angry crowd.

Finally, may I wish all our readers a very Happy Christmas and thank you for your comments on this column. They are all very much appreciated. Peter.

At the October meeting there was an update on the Neighbourhood Plan which is progressing really well. Cllr John Cheshire has been leading the project for the council and Chairs the steering group. He has done a huge amount of work, with the help of residents who joined the steering group, to get the background evidence together that will support the plan and the policies. The questionnaires that many of you filled in have been extremely useful and have informed the documents that have been produced. The documents have been shared on our website and social media and the Parish Council and steering group welcome feedback from residents.

The Council have received a letter from the Boundary Commission following a request for a boundary review. Here is the content of the letter.

NINFIELD PARISH COUNCIL: REQUEST FOR PRINCIPAL AREA BOUNDARY REVIEW

Thank you for your recent correspondence regarding Ninfield Parish Council. Further to my acknowledgement of your client's principal area boundary review (PABR) request, I can now confirm that the Commission Board considered this matter at its meeting on 21 September 2021.

The Board decided that it was not minded, at this time, to proceed with a PABR in the Ninfield area. As stated in our Guidance, we would not normally consider conducting such a review without the explicit support of both the principal authorities concerned (Rother District Council and Wealden District Council). Additionally, as indicated in our Guidance, this scale of change would require assurances from the Section 151 officers of both Rother and Wealden district councils that the proposed change would not have an adverse impact on the efficient and effective service delivery of local government services in the area. On the matter of aligning to Parliamentary boundaries, this is not something we would have regard to, either when conducting an electoral review or a PABR.

In addition to the above, the Commission has a full programme of electoral review work timetabled for the next few years and therefore is not in a position at this time to consider a PABR in the Ninfield area. The Board acknowledges the strong feelings of local residents and would like to thank you for the useful information provided in support of the proposal.

Should the situation change in respect of a PABR for the area, I will notify you. My strong advice would be to approach both district councils to establish whether they wish to make a joint request to the Commission for a PABR. I have attached a copy of our guidance, which you may have already seen, but which can be accessed by contact the Clerk as the link we were given will not print in an acceptably usable format

The Councillors are now discussing the next steps.

The next meeting will be 16th December 7pm at Ninfield Methodist Hall and residents are welcome to come along... there may even be a mince pie... shhh

A Small Community Garden?

Short Story

The year was 1980. She was 19 years old and working in a nursing home for the elderly. Full of fun but at times, a little short on patience, which is not an uncommon thing in a 19 year old. Every day her job was different, never a dull moment due to the variation of the residents, some of whom suffered from dementia. It was for this reason that the bathroom situated at the bottom of a long hallway outside room 9 was locked from the outside.

The house, as I shall call it, was a grand affair if somewhat gloomy at times, situated down a long sweeping gravel drive, that in the spring and summer would fill your senses with the perfume of roses and lavender thanks to the lavish attention of old George, the gardener. The day in question she arrived for work full of good humour as her shift would finish at 2'o'clock Whereupon she would meet her latest boyfriend who said he had a surprise for her. The morning passed uneventfully .2'o'clock arrived and she made her way to the bathroom outside room 9 so that she could change and shower in time for her date. Just as she was admiring herself in the mirror she heard a familiar shuffling noise moving towards the door, and the slow laborious sliding of the lock from the outside at the top. It must be Mavis from room 9. How on earth could she have moved the stiff old bolt.

"No Mavis" she cried" undo it I'm in here, you have locked me in!" Then the slow shuffle back along the hall as Mavis with her dementia was happily unaware of what she had done.

After a few attempts at calling for help she realised it was useless, no one would hear her down this isolated part of the building. She was becoming increasingly agitated, imagining herself missing her date. Praying for a solution came in the form of an open window. She didn't really consider the possible consequences when she made her next decision. But in her impatience to escape she had underestimated her true size, which was larger than the size 8 she saw staring back at her when she glanced in the mirror! So with all the effort and determination she could muster she stood on the toilet seat and shoved herself, saying a prayer to the almighty as she did so, through the window. The sound of her dress ripping made it obvious that the unthinkable had happened. She was stuck fast. Now with her dress caught up and ripped with all her underwear showing she was hanging precariously upside down on the outside of the window struggling in her attempt to free herself from falling on to the gravel some distance below.

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
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Sami's Reviews, Revues and a little bit of News!

He attended Parish Council meetings, and was interested in all that went on in the village.

He was a key person in the Speedwatch Group and he also ran the Ninfield Neighbourhood Watch, calling meetings, liaising with the police and publicising scams. Rod was also an active member of the Horticultural Society which reflected his keen interest in gardening, he organised their programme of speakers and helped with the shows. At his side (until just over a year ago) was his lovely wife Pat, together they both got stuck in and did what needed doing in the village, both were people with a real community spirit.

Rod passed away very suddenly at the end of September, a great shock to his family and to those of us in Ninfield who knew him. Jesus felt sorru for them so he taught and healed them.






