# Dear friends,

Karl Barth once asked, "what other time or season can or will the church ever have but that of Advent?" He was reminding people that Advent names the time between the birth of Jesus and Jesus' second coming. Until Jesus returns, the Church, in some sense, remains in a suspended season of Advent. The Kingdom of God, which Jesus inaugurated remains in a state of "not yet". Ultimately, the worst thing has already happened; humanity has killed God. That led to the defeat of evil through the death and resurrection of the Son of God. But whilst the Kingdom of God is brought nearer, it is clear that God's will is not yet done on earth as it is in heaven. Indeed, we must pray it might still be so.

During Advent, we will hear read parts of Isaiah, and particularly the Suffering Servant passage. The latter part of Isaiah was written as a response to Jerusalem's fall, and its people's exile. It was a time characterised by hopelessness and struggle. Into it, hope was sounded by Isaiah, through his disciples, after his death. The exile had caused the Israelites to lose faith in God. Even after pleading for them to return, they remained rebellious. And so God offered a hopeful promise, that something new would take place through his servant.

The Church is the fruit of the fulfilment of God's promise through Isaiah, arising from Jesus who restored Israel back to God. The promise of Advent is a promise of hope; that God will be present as we journey through the wilderness. Even in the gloom of December and the heart of winter, we can know that all of earth's longings will be fulfilled in Christ. God's Kingdom appears patchy on earth; it won't be fulfilled until Jesus returns. That is why we pray in Advent, "Come, Lord Jesus".

So we celebrate the birth of a baby for whom we've spent a season praying. He comes among us in the Eucharist or Holy Communion, our food for the journey. He comes in nativity plays and, in the gospel. He comes in the babies born on Christmas Day. We see Him coming in a million different ways because of the way he once came into the world through Mary. This is the reason for our hope; the Light of the world was born into our world, remains in our lives through the sacraments and the Scriptures, and will come again in glory. Until then, we are called to be faithful, celebrating Christmas, with joy that, despite it all, amidst it all, God is with us.

Wishing you all a Merry Christmas. Paul

Help us, in thankfulness and love, to share Your Christmas Light and Hope and Joy. Hallelujah!

# **Country Ways** Bio-dioversity

I have been asked, politely, if I could use this story to highlight the Church's plan for increasing the diversity of life found on our Church yard. Bio-diversity has become a national campaign approved of by the Bishops, Churchs are now asked to look into managing their land differently. We have a big tick and smiley face for the things we done already. There will be a 'could do better' on our report but no finance and it will be unlikely to find a Bishop going around with my Poo-per-scooper!

So what have we tried to do. When I moved here five years ago I was greeted by the wonderful sight of wild flower's and drifts of meadow brown butterflies. These have diminished and the church is trying to slow their decline. It is easier to cater for butterflies; all our gardens have plants that attract these insects but without the plants the butterflies lay their eggs on there will be no caterpillars and therefore no butterflies! Here is the problem the caterpillar friendly plants most people name as weeds. The balance of nature was here long before we had domestic flowers.

So we are trying to plan for a mowing system that increases the plants and grasses to accommodate insects. There will be an area where the grass is mown regularly, That grass will have no increase in its bio-diversity, but looks nice. There will be grass that's mown for the Church Fete. This area will have flowers that have finished seeding before the Fete, any plants that produce seed that requires longer for the seed to ripen will **d**ie out. There are of course flowering plants that can be mown and if left will come back, daisies and clover are examples; also there are plants that spread out at ground level, buttercups is one that comes to mind. The next area of interest is the land that is not mown until the end of summer, these areas have the most flowers, like the ox eye daisies and nap weed as their seeds ripen late. There should also be areas where no, with exceptions, work is carried out.

So the meadow brown feeds on the flowers, lays its eggs on the softer grasses where they hatch, feed and grow; later in their development they can then eat the tougher grasses. Once at full size they then pupate, that is they form an outer layer attached to the grasses where the caterpillar changes into a butterfly ready to start the circle of life next year. Mowing grasses

will destroy the meadow browns life cycle. It would be possible to go through the same life cycles for all the butterflies but there will be differences. Replace grasses for hedgerow plants or plants of the rough lands. By rough land, that's those corners where nettles and Jack in the hedge grow. Without these feed plants butterflies numbers will diminish and they are diminishing country wide.

Now I can, when my ageing brain is awake, start to understand the needs of the few butterflies we have here. Moths, there will be hundreds of different kinds, are beyond me. Then look a book on native insects and the thousands of different species there. If this hasn't caused a brain burp then bring every other living thing into this web of interconnection!

As a game keeper supporting proper land management is crucial for keeping the game on your land. This is understood and acted upon because the extra yield in game numbers has a financial value.

At the end of the summer I saw a flock of goldfinches on the seed heads found around the oldest tomb stones, there were at least twenty of them. It has been a long time since I have seen finches in flocks! Last week around by the west facing church door, there was a pile of white bird droppings along with dozens of regurgitated pellets. Either an Owl or Kestrel is using the church as a roost. These pellets are the remains of mice, mice who could be eating the grass seeds we left to mature. So how do we put a value on this! AT

## NEWS UPDATE FROM THE SURGERY

As a result of the ever changing NHS climate, and for many of the reasons I outlined in the last Parish News piece that I wrote, the existing partners at the surgery made the tough decision to hand the contract over to a small group of GPs called Vita Healthcare. Vita is a small NHS partnership of 3 GPs who own 4 other practices in Eastbourne, Polegate and Alfriston. Further information at <a href="https://www.vita.healthcare/">https://www.vita.healthcare/</a> should you wish to browse their website. This change took effect from the 1st September.

Neither myself, nor Dr Warden, nor the other two previous partners Dr French and Dr Kochhar have left the practice, and we will continue to see patients at the practice as we did beforehand. We are now employees, rather than employers, and as such we are alleviated of the burden of dealing with HR and other administrative processes, which were taking up ever increasing amounts of time. There is something to be said for economies of scale, and a lot of what we were doing manually/ourselves can now be done by experienced admin teams leaving us to do what we want to be doing – i.e. seeing patients.

At the moment things feel broadly similar to how they did before I became a partner back in 2019, in that I am now focussed once again on simply seeing the patients. I don't doubt that there will be some changes on the horizon, I know the team are wanting to improve patient access and therefore adjust the triage system somewhat....watch this space. With the NHS climate the way it is, change is inevitable whoever is in charge, but hopefully the community feel the benefit of whatever is planned. We have certainly had some good feedback from the way they chose to run the flu clinics this year.

I hope this explains some of what has been happening, there have been notices up on the website and on the door of the building as well, but I do realise it may have seemed quite a sudden announcement, so I hope this explains things further.

I will also take this opportunity to wish everyone a Merry Xmas from the team at Ninfield surgery, the festive season will soon be upon us!

# TIME

The origin of the duodecimal system could possibly be traced to a system of finger counting based on the knuckle bones of the four larger fingers. Using the thumb as a pointer, it is possible to count to 12 by touching each finger bone, starting with the farthest bone on the fifth finger, and counting on. In this system, one hand counts repeatedly to 12, while the other displays the number of iterations, until five dozens, i.e. the 60, is reached. This system is still in use in many regions of Asia.

Thus we get 60 seconds in a minute, 60 minutes in an hour and 24 hours in a day.

There are twelve signs of the zodiac, twelve months in a year, and the Babylonians had twelve hours in a day. Traditional Chinese calendars, clocks, and compasses are based on the twelve Earthly Branches or 24 Solar terms. There are 12 inches in an imperial foot, 12 troy ounces in a troy pound, 12 old pence in a shilling, and many other items are counted by the dozen, gross (144, square of 12), or great gross (1728, cube of 12).

The Romans used a fraction system based on 12, including the uncia, which became both the English words ounce and inch. Predecimalisation, Ireland and the United Kingdom used a mixed duodecimal-vigesimal currency system (12 pence = 1 shilling, 20 shillings or 240 pence to the pound sterling), the remnants of which persist in many places.

Time uses a duodecimal system. The first sundials were simply stakes placed in the ground that indicated time by the length and direction of the resulting shadow. As early as 1500 B.C., the Egyptians had developed a more advanced sundial. A T-shaped bar placed in the ground, this instrument was calibrated to divide the interval between sunrise and sunset into 12 parts. When sundials were first used, Egyptian astronomers also first observed a set of 36 stars that divided the circle of the heavens into equal parts. The passage of night could be marked by the appearance of 18 of these stars, three of which were assigned to each of the two twilight periods when the stars were difficult to view.

The period of total darkness was marked by the remaining 12 stars, again resulting in 12 divisions of night During the New Kingdom this measuring system was simplified to use a set of 24 stars, 12 of which marked the passage of the night. So, once both the light and dark hours were divided into 12 parts, the concept of a 24-hour day was in place. But fixed-length hours, however, had to wait until Greek astronomers began using such a system for their theoretical calculations. Hipparchus proposed dividing the day into 24 equinoctial hours, based on the 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of darkness observed on equinox days.

The Babylonians made astronomical calculations in the sexagesimal (base 60) system they inherited from the Sumerians, who developed it around 2000 B.C. Although it is unknown why 60 was chosen, it is notably convenient for expressing fractions, since 60 is the smallest number divisible by the first six counting numbers as well as by 10, 12, 15, 20 and 30. Hard to imagine, but both the circular face of a clock and the sphere of a globe owe their divisions to a 4,000-year-old numeric system of the Babylonians.

The Greek astronomer Eratosthenes used a sexagesimal system to divide a circle into 60 parts in order to devise an early geographic system of latitude, with the horizontal lines running through well-known places on the earth at the time. A century later, Hipparchus normalized the lines of latitude, making them parallel and obedient to the earth's geometry. He also devised a system of longitude lines that encompassed 360 degrees and that ran north to south, from pole to pole. Claudius Ptolemy explained and expanded on Hipparchus' work by subdividing each of the 360 degrees of latitude and longitude into smaller segments. Each degree was divided into 60 parts, each of which was again subdivided into 60 smaller parts. The first division, partes minutae primae, or first minute, became known simply as the "minute." The second segmentation, partes minutae secundae, or "second minute," became known as the second.

So, it's now TIME for me to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy and Healthy New Year. KR




