Dear friends,

What a fantastic experience we all had over the Jubilee weekend. A big thank you to all who helped make the events in both villages such a success. It really did bring our communities together after such a long 2 years of not being able to do much. Apart from celebrating the Queens fantastic Jubilee it was also a chance to celebrate our communities.

Thankfully the lock down restrictions that have been part of our lives for so long are well behind us and we now move to a new sort of normality. We are now able to do some of the things we took for granted before, and as we begin to socialise more, travel, and catch up with family I think each one of us will discover that the coronavirus pandemic has changed us in some way. Some have tragically lost loved ones through this time, some have lost jobs and incomes, some have been furloughed whilst others have been working harder than ever. Some have lost precious planned events; family parties and celebrations, baptisms and weddings have had to be rescheduled. End of year proms, exams, holidays and a whole host of other things precious to us have been lost too and that will have taken its toll on all of us. Hopefully many of these activities are now taking place!

We saw that clearly in our 2 villages in the Jubilee Celebrations so let us now build on that and make our 2 communities even stronger.

NEWS FROM ST. OSWALD'S.

Plans to install fully functional toilet facilities accessible to all in St. Oswald's church have received a significant and most generous boost by way of a donation of £400.00 from the Hooe Community Group. The cheque was presented to churchwardens Jack Rist and Janet Pattisson at the recent Hooe Community Group Jubilee Coffee Morning held in St. Oswald's.

Biodiversity in the churchyard

A small group is to be established to manage the churchyard so as to increase wildflowers and wildlife - this is an initiative that is also promoted by the Diocese. A member of the group is currently hard at work trying to identify every species living in the churchyard.

An Archdeacon's Faculty has been granted to allow repairs identified in the last Inspection to commence, although this is unlikely to be before September as Parker's are very busy.

The two churchwardens met with our Inspecting Architect, James Ford, to discuss the initial comments from the Diocese and Wealden Planning Department on the plans for the toilet and slight amendments were agreed

HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

Hooe History Society is continuing to meet in Hooe Church at present. Our speaker in July is David Swales who will talk on Michelham Priory. David is a volunteer at Michelham and has done some considerable research into its history. We look forward to welcoming him to Hooe Church at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday 21st July.

Did you know... we saw last month how the Hooe United Benefit Society (HUBS) provided funds through members' subscriptions for those requiring medical treatment or who were unable to work because of illness or infirmity. The Liberal government of the day, however, introduced legislation that would cause a great deal of division in this and many other villages.

The **National Insurance Act 1911** created National Insurance, originally a system of health insurance for industrial workers in Great Britain based on contributions from employers, the government, and the workers themselves. It was to be one of the foundations of the modern welfare state.

The bill was introduced by the Prime Minister David Lloyd-George to Parliament on 4 May 1911. It was passed and became law on 16 December 1911. It went into effect on 1 July 1912.

The Hooe Society had 154 members and £720 in the bank and it was for the members to decide whether or not to continue in the face of this newly formed national institution. Its administrators were vocal in their wish to continue the HUBS alongside the National scheme, to which the following proposals were made at a meeting in February 1912:-

"That when the National Insurance Act comes into operation this Hooe U.B.S. provide for its state members benefits additional to those secured under the Act.

Also (paraphrased) State insured members would pay eightpence per month and non-State insured members at a reduced rate, for sick pay as paid at present".

There were many meetings and votes called during the first six months of 1912 to try and determine the views of the membership, but without a definitive decision. At that time, Mr H. Cautley, M.P. for East Grinstead, was at the head of a movement to get all the small friendly societies in Sussex to become associated together as one approved society, and this option was put forward for consideration by the members. Then, when a meeting of members was called for the 24th May with a recommendation to follow this course of action, only six villagers turned up, which effectively eliminated

all thoughts of continuing alongside the National scheme.

The Bexhill Chronicle reported on Saturday 13th July, 1912,

"It has now been definitely decided by the Hooe United Benefit Society to "share out" and this will shortly be done. The sum of £40 will be left in the treasurer's funds as a balance. Mr. J. Gates has been elected secretary of the society, in place of Mr. J. Newport, who resigned".

Following this, Viscount Hythe, who was greatly interested in the club, and whose father, Earl Brassey, had assisted to start it, and had been a generous subscriber, wrote to the Rector in August, 1912:-

"Dear Mr. Routh,

I very much regret to learn that the resident members of the Hooe Friendly Society desire to dissolve the Society and share out the considerable available funds. Now that an Approved Society has been formed for Sussex to which all village societies can be affiliated, I think that the course the members of the Hooe Society propose to adopt is a great mistake. They will, in my judgement, be better off under the Insurance Act by keeping their old Society going than by becoming Post Office contributors or joining another Society..... Yours very truly, HYTHE".

This was clearly a very controversial subject amongst the villagers, with strongly held contrasting opinions on both sides. Reading between the lines, it appears that those who were major contributors (generally, employers) were in favour of it continuing whilst the lesser donors (employees) were the ones who ultimately forced the closure through. The Bexhill Chronicle reported that the individual pay out would be 5s 7d for each year they had been in the Society, so somebody with 10 years' membership would receive £2-15s-10d (£2 79p in today's money) – their contributions in that time would have been £4 0s 0d so the payment was not a life changing amount. The Hooe United Benefit Society had served them splendidly for 58 years, but the Welfare State was about to begin.

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NINFIELD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

We don't have much going on in July as we are building to our big show in August but, to encourage new exhibitors, I thought we could use this months report to give some guidance on showing.

Read the rules and class description carefully - Always read the Show rules and class title carefully. You must enter only home grown produce. Check the number specified in the Schedule for the class you wish to enter - if it says 8 pods runner beans or 4 flapjacks you will be disqualified ('NAS' - not as schedule) if you have too few or too many. It is worth bringing along a few extra as spares just in case you find you need them when you are placing your exhibit.

Start small - Show a small set of flowers/fruit/vegetables/domestics to ensure you have a stress-free Show. If you are new to showing don't be tempted to enter too many classes. Preparing entries for showing takes a bit of time.

Prepare your vegetables/fruit – try to find exhibits that are of a similar size/shape. Lettuces should be show with their roots, flowers should be left on courgettes, stalks on cabbages, tops on carrots and beetroot, calyx (stalk) on tomatoes and other fruit, wipe over your potatoes with a sponge don't scrub them.

Vases- for the summer show, the horticultural society provides vases for you to show your flowers. All we ask is that you bring your own newspaper/wire to pack the vases should your flowers need help to keep upright.

Flowers- make sure dahlias are clear of any bugs. We have new dahlia classes this year to encourage new exhibitors. Check leaves and petals of all flowers and shrubs for damage – especially if showing single specimens. Domestic classes – the horticultural society provides covers for domestic classes. Decoration/filling should not include fresh cream. Preserves should be free from commercial trademarks. Jars should be filled to the brim to allow for shrinkage.

If in doubt - ask the show organiser. If I don't know the answer, there will be someone else on the committee that will.

But the most important thing to remember is to have a go. You've got to be in it to win it!



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The Queen's Dogs

Royal corgis were the Pembroke Welsh Corgi dogs owned by Elizabeth II and her parents, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother. Fond of corgis since she was a small child, Elizabeth II has owned more than 30 corgis since she became Queen of the Commonwealth realms in 1952. Elizabeth II owned at least one Corgi at any given time between the years 1933–2018. In 2007, Elizabeth II had five corgis: Monty, Emma, Linnet, Willow, and Holly; five cocker spaniels: Bisto, Oxo, Flash, Spick, and Span; and four dorgis (dachshund-corgi crossbreeds):

Cider, Berry, Vulcan, and Candy. Monty, Willow, and Holly appeared in the 2012 Olympic opening ceremony when, in a sketch, Daniel Craig (in character as James Bond) arrived at Buckingham Palace to escort the Queen to the event. Monty had previously belonged to the Queen Mother, and died in September 2012. The royal corgis were globally publicised (such as in the cover photo and feature article of Vanity Fair's Summer 2016 edition). Leaving a lasting legacy after death, they have been depicted and immortalised in various artwork, such as statues, professional photographs, and paintings. For instance, the crown coin commemorating the Golden Jubilee of Elizabeth II depicts the Queen with a corgi.

The Queen has been very fond of corgis since she was a small child, having fallen in love with the corgis owned by the children of the Marquess of Bath. King George VI brought home Dookie in 1933. A photograph from George VI's photo album shows a ten-year-old Princess Elizabeth with Dookie at Balmoral. Elizabeth and her sister Princess Margaret would feed Dookie by hand from a dish held by a footman. Another early favourite corgi was Jane.

Elizabeth II's mother, Queen Elizabeth, introduced a disciplined regimen for the dogs; each had its own wicker basket, raised above the floor to avoid drafts. Meals were served for each dog in its own dish, the diet approved by veterinary experts with no titbits from the royal table. Meat dog biscuits was served in the morning and dog meal with gravy late afternoon .

Crackers (24 December 1939, Windsor – November, 1953) was one of the Queen Mother's corgis, and nearly a constant companion; he retired with the Queen Mother to the Castle of Mey in Scotland. In 1944, Elizabeth was given Susan as a gift on her 18th birthday and accompanied Elizabeth on her honeymoon in 1947. The corgis owned by the Queen are descended from Susan. Rozavel Sue, daughter of Rozavel Lucky Strike, an international champion, was one of the Queen's corgis in the early 1950s.

The Queen has owned over thirty corgis since 1952. When Elizabeth and Prince Philip visited Grand Cayman in 1983, government officials gifted her black coral sculptures of a corgi and a horse made by Bernard Passman.

Domestic life: Sugar was the nursery pet of Prince Charles and Princess Anne. In 1955, her dogs, Whisky and Sherry, were surprise Christmas gifts from the Queen to the Prince and Princess. Pictured with the royal family, the corgi Sugar made the cover of The Australian Women's Weekly on 10 June 1959.

Heather was born in 1962 and became one of the Queen's favourites. Heather was the mother of Tiny, Bushy, and Foxy; Foxy gave birth to Brush in 1969. The corgis enjoyed a privileged life in Buckingham Palace. They resided in a bespoke room devoted to their habitation, known as the Corgi Room, and slept in elevated wicker baskets. The Queen tended to the corgis in her kennel herself. She also chose the sires of litters that were bred in her kennel. The corgis had an extensive menu at the palace which included fresh rabbit and beef, served by a gourmet chef. At Christmas, the Queen made stockings for her pets full of toys and delicacies such as biscuits.

The dogs have traditionally been buried at Sandringham estate in Norfolk. The graveyard was first used by Queen Victoria when her Collie, Noble, died in 1887. Prince Andrew gave The Queen some corgi puppies in April 2021, after the death of The Duke of Edinburgh.

Victims: On several occasions, the Queen or her staff have been injured by the corgis. In 1954, the palace clock winder, Leonard Hubbard, was bitten by Susan upon entering the nursery at the Royal Lodge, Windsor. Later in the same year, one of the Queen Mother's corgis bit a policeman on guard duty in London. In 1968, Peter Doig called for the royal staff to put up a "Beware of the dog" sign at Balmoral after one of the corgis bit the postman. In February 1989, it was reported that the royal family had hired an animal psychologist to tame the dogs after they developed a habit of nipping them and the staff." And in 1989, the Queen Mother's dog, Ranger, led a pack of corgis that attacked and killed the Queen's beloved dorgi, Chipper.

In March 1991, the Queen was bitten after trying to break up a fight between ten or so of her corgis. She had to have three stitches to her left hand. John Collins, the Queen Mother's chauffeur, had to have a tetanus injection after he also tried to intervene. In 2003, Pharos, a tenth-generation offspring of Susan, was put down after being mauled by Princess Anne's English bull terrier, Dottie. Anne arrived at Sandringham to visit her mother for Christmas and the corgis rushed out of the front door as they arrived. It was reported that "Dottie went for Pharos, savaging the corgi's hind legs and breaking one in three places."

For half a century, all of the 96-year-old royal's Corgis descended from her first pup Susan. In 2009, she made the decision to cease breeding after two of her favourite dogs succumbed to cancer. When she announced the decision, the Queen had six corgis. It was reported in 2015 that the Queen stopped breeding corgis so as not to leave any behind when she died. Her final corgi, Willow, died in April 2018. Two dorgis, Vulcan and Candy, survived longer, Vulcan died of 'old age' in 2020. The Queen's only remaining dorgi was Candy, before it was joined by another dorgi pup named Fergus and a pure-bred corgi called Muick in 2021. Fergus died in the same year. In June 2021, she was gifted a new corgi by her family.

And her furry companions made headlines on Saturday following the Jubilee concert where royal fans were left stunned by a giant corgi that lit up the sky. The memorable light show used a series of drones to create dazzling displays in the night sky.

But things will come to settle down. It's life, when Mistress wears a crown; Yes, it will pass, you all will see This business of the Jubilee.

So, we shall wag our doggy tails! Be happy, like the Prince of Wales! We think the Boss has done just fine Being Queen for all this time!
