Dear friends,

This month brings Refugee Week, 15th to 20th June, a festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary; and encouraging understanding of why people are displaced, and the challenges they face when seeking safety.

There's a moment in Martin Luther King's historic 'I have a dream' speech when he turns his attention to the White people who, realising their destiny and that of their Black fellow citizens was intertwined, joined the movement for equal rights. "They have come to realise that their freedom is inextricably bound to our freedom," he said. "We cannot walk alone." of course refugees are in the forefront of our thinking now with people fleeing from Ukraine.

Life is tough for many of us right now and especially for refugees and the future feels very uncertain. Looking after ourselves, our families and communities takes time and energy. The challenges of the past 2 years have exposed the deep inequalities between us, including in housing, income and access to healthcare. But the crisis has also shown how interconnected we are – that the wellbeing of each of us depends on the welfare, safety and hard work of others. We are part of a shared 'us'.

Martin Luther King may have been speaking in the 1960s, but his words resonate across space and time. Here in the UK and across the world today, we know that it is only by coming together that we will move forward. That when we choose to walk side by side, we create deeper and longer-lasting change than is possible alone.

'We Cannot Walk Alone', is an invitation to extend your hand to someone new, who is outside your current circle, or has experience you haven't. Now more than ever we need a collective act of reaching out; a space for us all to listen, to exchange and connect. To find out what we can learn from each other, and what we can build together.

As we recover from Covid, we are realising afresh that we cannot walk alone, how much we need those friends and family. But we also must remember that 'we cannot walk alone' in a much wider sense, that wider world of inter-dependence.

This is a time to give thanks, and out of that thankfulness, to make commitments for the future. A time to give thanks for these freedoms restored – and to commit ourselves to not take them for granted, to work for those freedoms for all in our society. A time to give thanks for all those whose work has got us to this point – in the health service, research, transport, hospitality, etc – to recognise what a hard time they have had, and to commit ourselves not to take them for granted again.

It's a time, as we celebrate family reunions, to remember those who still can't see their family and friends – whether for health reasons, or because those dear to them are far away across the world, or have been lost in the pandemic. To continue to pray for and support them, offer our friendship, in whatever way we can. To actively pray for and support the people of Ukraine. We cannot walk alone – and as we walk together in the church, we walk with a purpose, to bring the love of God to those around us. This month we celebrate the lives of a number of missionary saints, all remarkable individuals but who always worked and journeyed together with others.

Greatest of all, Peter and Paul, the fisherman and the scholar who shaped the early church as they journeyed with their companions, including Barnabas. Their lives show us that we don't have to all be alike, or even get on well together, to serve our Lord! And following them, Columba of Iona in the 6th century and Boniface of Crediton in the 7th century, taking the faith to Scotland and Germany respectively, founding monasteries to be their bases and support, to train others to go out in mission. So we welcome those whose lives have been shattered by war and in Christ we offer the hand of friendship and pray for a better future for all. Paul

Prizes will be awarded to the best crowns chosen by those hunting, there will be three categories, children 11 and under; children 12 to 16 adults 17 plus.

You need to tell us where the crown will be sited and the group, the creator is from. We will give you a number to put on it.

Please let me have these phone calls or emails by TUESDAY 31st MAY If you don't live in the centre of the village or don't have anywhere to put a crown, you can still join in, we'll put your crown somewhere! There are lots of finger posts, open spaces, corners! Just let me know.

Then on the day, go along to either the Methodist Hall or the Memorial Hall and pick up a form, as it's 70 years, the entry fee is 70p, they will also have teas, coffees, cakes, all 70p! Then head off around the village and put the house name or number against the number on each crown, say which one you like best in each category, then return the forms to one or other Hall by 4.00pm.

Prizes for the best in each category will be awarded on Saturday at the Village Fete at 4.30 after the raffle, along with a prize for finding all the crowns!

HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

Happily, the "new normal" is starting to look a little bit like the old one with regard to the numbers who attend our monthly meetings and it is such a nice experience after the nearly two years of lockdown and uncertainty. Our other recent change is that we have been forced to move our venue for meetings to Hooe church, with the kind permission of our vicar and the churchwardens. We squeeze ourselves in between the bell tower and the main door and it

is actually quite a cosy arrangement. Our meeting on Thursday 16th June will be Jan Black, who will be giving a talk on "Sussex Food" – on Sussex Day. The best thing is that she will be bringing along tasters! Does it get any better than that? Hooe church, 7.30 p.m.

DID YOU KNOW... that in the latter half of the 19th century the inhabitants of Hooe established a club which supported its members in times of sickness or incapacity. It was variously known as the Hooe Club, Friendly Society or United Benefit Society and was run by a number of prominent villagers including the vicar at the time. Funds appear to have been provided through subscriptions by members and donations given by more wealthy benefactors. The school log books refer to a days' holiday being given every year on "Club Day" and I have picked out a few relevant passages from the newspapers of the time in order to give a flavour of how the Society developed and flourished.

In May 1893 – "Mr. J. Veness proposed "The health of the Officers," and said the club had been established now something like 39 years, (circa 1854 –Ed) out of which they went on for about 20 years without having an annual dinner, the result of which they got nearly "broke." He argued that the inauguration of the annual dinner and its attendant amusements had brought young fellows to join the society, and established its success ." Also, "Mr. Eldridge, who responded, said had visited many clubs, but he did not remember ever having been to a club with such a balance-sheet as shown by the Hooe United Benefit Society."

May 1903 – "After service (in the church) the members paraded the streets of the village, and then proceeded to the marquee erected in the Red Lion meadow, where a capital dinner was provided... Hooe itself is a rather quaint relic of the past, but its Club and its annual Club Day are interesting survivals of village life which are somewhat rare in these days of rural depopulation and decadence. The Club itself is one of the very few village Clubs pure and simple which now exist. Its name, Hooe United Benefit Society, typifies its nature. It is an association of the natives of Hooe for their own help and protection in days of sickness and adversity. Living in the midst of a charming country, stretching for miles on every hand in undulations of pasture, furrow, hedgerow, and wood, the possibility has not occurred to the members of an epidemic or a pestilence, which might sweep their funds away, so they have no intention of surrendering their treasured independence and boasted isolation to any of the great Friendly Societies, in which many of the old Village Clubs have been merged; Safe in the security of £600 at the bank, the Hooe Uniteds are quite content to rely on themselves and trust Providence to guard them against a great calamity".

"Thursday was universally observed as a holiday within the parish of Hooe, and foreign folk hastened from their labours at the close of the day, and flocked to the field at the back of the inn as if they envied the Hooe people their good fortune. Picture a huge marguee, in which hundreds of young and old are seated around a rough platform on which a military band discourses sweet music, the youngsters sitting in open-mouthed amazement at the volumes of sound, the young men and maidens ogling each other and the old men guaffing copious draughts of beer from capacious pots - outside a small and compact fair, sweet stalls, with the famous gingerbread and stickjaw glued on sticks, dispensed by a loguacious lady who maintains a fusillade of shouts at her offspring in the distance while she disposes of her goods; a counter of marvellous toys, behind which sits a smart frizzled haired young lady; a stall of squirters or lady teazers, half a dozen swings, a shooting "gallery," ring-throwing stands for walking-sticks and clocks, an Aunt Sally up to date, in the shape of wonderful faces, through the mouths of which you are invited to send a wooden ball; with the inevitable cocoanut shy and the caravans in the background-place these things on the canvas of the mind, and it will give a fair idea of the Club Day festivities at Hooe".

By 1911, the Hooe United Benefit Society had 154 members, \pounds 720 14s 6d in the bank (valued over \pounds 90,000 today – Ed) and the Rev. Cuthbert Routh described it as the most important institution in Hooe. There were, however, momentous events to shortly follow, which would cause serious divisions in the village as to the viability of this 57 year old institution.... which I will continue in next month's issue.

<u> AWealden Local Plan</u>

Our councillors scrutinised the supporting reports and presentations, offeed factual argument against the erroneous categorisation of our village as a sustainable settlement (eg a village with a much greater level of amenity) but to no avail.

Ultimately the WLP was rejected in 2019 by the Inspector, who cited Wealden District Council's failure to comply with the terms of reference and for placing too much emphasis on the exclusion of the Ashdown Forest area. WDC continue to work on the plan but completion of a draft plan is not expected until 2024. This puts Ninfield at a disadvantage. We will continue to be a target for developers who will exploit the lack of an identified 5-year land supply.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

Work on the NDP is led with great dedication by Cllr John Cheshire in conjunction with our consultants, AiRS. and co ordinating the work of the volunteers from the village to bring together the many elements of the document. Stage 1 is now complete. We await the result of the 2021 census to compare growth of the village from 2001, 2011 and 2021.

Improving and promoting Community Wellbeing

Led by Councillor Jackie Langley who with much enthusiasm started the Health and Wellbeing Group. Their activities are open to all ages with health walks, coffee mornings, games afternoons and film evenings to mention but a few of their events. The latest addition to this group is *the Dark Skies Group led by Kaye Crittell*,

In the two years since the last Annual Parish Meeting we have:

Three new Councillors - Kamala Williamson, Sheila Collins and Gary Pharo.

Two new committees - The Recreation Ground Committee, led by Sami Guard, working to improve equipment and use of the recreation ground and playground.

- Highways and Traffic Committee to look at issues that came out of the survey for the Neighbourhood Plan.

New Housing in Ninfield

Since our last AGM, construction has started on Ingrams Farm and Manchester Road developments.

Parish Council Boundary Review

In December 2020, a survey of electors in Ninfield resulted in 430 vote in favour of a move to Rother District Council with just 27 residents voting to remain under the jurisdiction of Wealden District Council.

So far WDC have refused to carry out a boundary review, however the Boundary Commission, impressed with our case, directed that we ask WDC for a statement of their reasons for refusal. We await their reply.

Our priorities for year ahead:

To continue to represent the best interests of the residents of Ninfield

To complete the Boundary Review and transfer Ninfield to Rother District Council if the residents still wish to do so.

To receive the inspector's approval for the Neighbourhood Development Plan

To resist overdevelopment of our village and loss of our cultural heritage an identity.

My report would not be complete without taking the opportunity to thank my friends and colleagues on the Parish Council for their support, hard work and good humour during the past year:

Kaye Crittell - for supporting me, the new chairman, sharing her vast knowledge of Ninfield matters and representing the council at away meetings. 23

John Cheshire - for his dedication and hard work on the NDP and prior to that leading Ninfield's planning committee

Paul Coleshill - for his help with the boundary review

Jackie Langley - for her work setting up the health and wellbeing group as well as representing the council at Wealden's Planning Committee meetings. Pete Holland – for his valuable planning advice when considering applications

Sheila Collins – taking over leadership of the Ninfield's planning meeting and representing the council at WDC's planning panel meetings.

Gary Pharo - for his work with the recreation committee and being heavily involved in speedwatch and his can-do approach to many practical matters.

This worm has been doing a lot of thinking about the Coronation and all the events surrounding it. My first recollection was that I had been living through four different Monarchs. My first was George V with Queen Mary. At that time I, with Mum & Dad, was living at Horam. One day Dad came home and told us that the King & Queen would be driving slowly through the village the next day. The whole village turned out and the lovely large car slowed right down and we all cheered as the King & Queen waved to us and nodded their heads. I remember asking why they hadn't got their crowns on. I didn't know that the king was ill and recuperating in Eastbourne, but sadly died the next year. The next King was of course Edward, we never saw sight of him and he was never actually crowned. George VI and Elizabeth came to the throne: we were living in Hailsham by them and I was lucky to see them at Royal Ascot having gone by coach to the races with my Mum. Everyone liked them a lot, but all too soon the King died by which time I was working in Eastbourne Public Library and the council decided to give us the day off to watch the Queens Coronation. Well we had not got a television set so we invaded my aunt & uncle who had got a small black & white set. A good number of us went to share the happy occasion. Afterwards Hailsham Young Farmers held an exciting cricket match on the recreation ground. It was lads' verses ladies and great fun, but I really cannot remember who won. I'm sure if my husband was still alive he would remember or at least say it was the men, whatever we all enjoyed ourselves. Then to round off the day we went to a super dance at the Pier ballroom in Eastbourne with Gordon Rider and his band, a popular band in those far off days.

It was back to work the next day but all the people who came plus the staff, twenty five of us in those days, shared happy memories of Coronation Day and how proud we were of our Queen Elizabeth and her husband Philip.

Now we look forward to the many events in June, celebrating the seventy years of the Queens reign and I sincerely hope that she will enjoy them as well.

YARROW

There was a time in this country when all the land was subject to the enclosure act; villages were removed if deemed to be in the wrong place and common land taken. It was a time of acute poverty in this land, where a rural worker did not earn enough to feed his family. The only access to the country side was the rights of way leading to a church. The land owners were powerful, but not enough to restrict the Church.

This all seems a tad far fetched until you read some of the writers of the time, William Cobbett is possible the most forceful in highlighting the sufferings of the rural poor.

During the black act you would be hanged for taking a rabbit, repealed to being deported after poachers started to fight back. There is a bit of a grim history here for game keepers. Mind the first keepers were little more than thugs with big sticks and bigger dogs.

Strange the things you think about whilst wandering around a Church yard, walking the dog in the quiet of the morning.

I had eaten the first green leaves from the hawthorn, bread and cheese as the old name went. I do it every year which seems strange for a chap who is not keen on eating most things green.

There is a fascination for me in learning some of the older ways, herb law being one. There is a slight problem here though, I find it all to easy to dismiss. I was once told that the name of the plant I was looking at was lung wort, because of the shape of the leaves being lung like. Interesting old name; I was then told it helped with lung issues because of its shape. That was a step to far.

I was offered a spring tonic, wild sorrel, goose grass and dandelion, never ever again. It even put me off a salad sandwich. I do understand that some of these wild plants do have a huge amount of vitamins and minerals, it must be what makes them taste so bad.

So the bridleways and Church yards were a source of food, all low in calories if high in vitamins and old school medicine.

There are two remedies I have come across which I actually found worked. Yarrow, which is very wide spread, and grows on most verges. I have found another, older, name for it – blood wort. There are many stories about herb use but this one seems to be at least, interesting, from a historical point of view.

Apparently, and all stories about herbs should start with apparently, when the British marched off to war in 1914 the amount of injuries expected were small compared with the slaughter that actually happened. So the medical preparations were massively under prepared. There then is a story that foragers were sent out to pick yarrow. Yes the old blood wort lived up to its name, it actually does congeal blood - stopping the bleeding. I have used it for years to staunch the blood from all manor of cuts, some actually quite nasty. It even works on the cuts dished out whilst unhooking pike; the pikes bite prevents blood clotting. This herb is so effective that I always have some growing near the back door.

If anyone if keen to try using yarrow on cuts, please check carefully you are picking the right plant, and don't believe a word I say, always double check.

The yarrow also has another name, Ladies Herb, and that's no place to go for an old gamekeeper.

The other concoction I have used is a mixture of equal parts plantain leaves and young oak leaves. This is then all boiled together and when cooled the liquid is wiped on unbroken skin to deal with sores and itches. It worked so well I took some to my doctor, easier thing to do back then. He said that there were so many tannins in that mix, one at least had to work. I suppose it was a bit like coal tar soap.

So what can we take from all this? well just perhaps that little piece of rough grassland is of more value than we give it credit for. I don't know half enough to start naming all the creatures that live in wild grassland. I also wouldn't doubt that some of the life going on there is actually unknown to science.

When I was a boy June was usually a wonderful month, sunny and warm. It was then that I use to help on the small farms around me with hay making. Cut the hay before it went to seed so it was more nutritious for the cows. This is what the old boys said to me, apparently it was true.

Rough grass needs to be cut at 'back end', that's the end of summer for all those unfamiliar with Lincolnshire speak. Here the wild flower seeds need to form and ripen so that next year there is life to carry the cycle onwards.

Its not easy, we have a natural desire to be neat and tidy. We all do it with our mowers and strimmers, not forgetting the hoe to remove annual weeds/wild flowers from the borders and vegetable plots. So if we have a bit of rough grassland that can be left until the end of summer perhaps we could try leaving it scruffy. If you have no space to leave to nature come and see the ox eye daisies this summer they grow in the long grass in certain areas of the church yard. Who knows what you may find, Janet the Church warden, found one single snake's head fritillary just this week and had not seen one here before!
