Dear Friends,

I expect like me you are saddened, even appalled to see the pictures on our TV screens of the events unfolding in Ukraine! We are so used to seeing violence in our films at the cinema and on the TV that we sometimes have to stop and think that this is reality, these are not actors, they are real people, real children! My heart goes out to them. Yet my heart is uplifted by the amount of effort and generosity happening across the globe to provide help to these terrified people. Death is a part of life but not this way.

Following a number of tragic deaths in the news, the radio programme I switched on in the car was doing a 'phone-in' feature on how to cope with the death of a loved one or friend. They listed various things people do, such as running the London Marathon for a charity in memory of the one who had died, and other 'coping mechanisms' or therapies. I am sure that, in their own way, they were positive and helpful suggestions, but I was sad to notice that there was not even a suggestion of offering the Christian hope of eternal life. All the suggestions were limited to the acceptance that life was over, and all that was left was memory. Those people in Ukraine need to have hope, they need to be able to look to the future but that's easy for me to write. I am not there. I have no idea how I would cope in such horrific circumstances; I cannot even begin to imagine what they are going through. Thursday 26th May is Ascension Day. Ascension Day affirms the sanctity of life in that God not only became man in Jesus Christ, but that after his death and Resurrection, Jesus took our humanity to 'the right hand of God on high'. Jesus came down to earth from heaven that we might go with him from earth to heaven. But Ascension Day is followed with Whitsunday or Pentecost. Having ascended back to be with the Father, Jesus sent his promised gift of the Holy Spirit to his disciples. What a transformation! So if Jesus ascended as the affirmation of his life as God's purposes for life

So if Jesus ascended as the affirmation of his life as God's purposes for life in his world, and if we can worship and pray through the Holy Spirit – then we have no choice but to recognise the sanctity of life, and that the val ue we place on any other life is the value we place on our own: then it is our duty and our joy to identify ourselves with the work of the Church and humanity in general to go out together in the power of the Spirit to live and work to his praise and glory. My hope and indeed prayer it that this tragedy will be over by the time this letter is published. Sadly, I doubt it. So let us pray for guidance to see the way forward and to find ways in which we can help these poor souls begin to rebuild their lives and their country. There are many acts of kindness happening locally as we try to collect money and goods to send to Ukraine. From a distance we try to do what we can, indeed often going that extra mile. That work needs to continue well into the future but more importantly we need to work for a worldwide recognition of the sanctity of life. That is the only way we can have a future! Paul Frostick



It saddens me to say this, although this is a but picture of St Mary's, it might be closer to the truth than we think! The situation cannot continue as it is for much longer! As know am involved in the village as much as possible and it seems people appreciate that. I am a great believer in the church going out into community. the The problem is they do not come to church.

The church finances are stretched to the limit. We just have had a new boiler fitted which cost over £8000. That is a lot for a small, even minute congregation to find! Last Sunday there were only 6 in church! That was the priest, the organist, my wife, and daughter so there were only 2 other members of the congregation there!

That is quite normal these days. A few have not returned since the lockdown for various reasons. Before Covid struck the situation was improving with more attending. To be totally honest I do not know the answer to this! We all know people want the church to be there for their weddings, baptisms, funerals etc but the church cannot exist just for those functions. It must operate every other day of the week as well. If the church did close then burials would not be allowed in the churchyard! It is not just a matter of finances either. When we held the open-air service on Remembrance Sunday there were over 160 people there! The online services I did during the lockdown had over 150 people using them, and probably more, as many were couples tuning in! That shows there is an interest in the life of the church. So why are there so few attending church? There are many other calls on people's time these days and church is competing with all this. Maybe we are not offering what people want?

This is not just a problem for Ninfield, it is happening in other communities as well. Yet Catsfield and Hooe are doing well. Why?

My purpose in writing this is not to scare monger but to start a dialogue. Please let me know your views, what we can do, what is it we are not doing? I would not like to be the one on whose watch the church closed. In a way it is coming to the stage of use it or lose it! I love being involved in the village, but the time will come when I have to hand the baton on to someone else. Who knows what will happen next? It is very probable that the villages will be merged with others under one priest. I have no idea what that will be or when, but I am just asking the question at this stage. I would love to see a thriving church, as that would encourage us all. Please email me your suggestions and comments so that I might take them on board as we plan for the future. I would love to be able to say the glass is half full but at this stage it doesn't look like it.

OUR SCHOOL Jubilee Special

As the Jubilee falls at the end of the May school holidays we will be having our Jubilee celebrations before the main event actually takes place.

We are starting our celebrations off with a 'street party' in the playground. This will take place on Friday 20th May and will involve all of the children, their parents and guardians. Traditional party food, flags and bunting will be much in evidence and the children have been asked to come dressed in red, white and blue. During the afternoon, each class will perform their own set piece associated with the 70 years of her majesty's rule.

Afterwards there will be an exhibition in the hall depicting each decade since the Queen came to the throne and showing some of the work the children have produced in class. Each class has been given a different decade to look at so the results should bring back fond memories to those of us able to remember most of them!

Parties are great, but they don't last forever so we also decided to start a project that would give us a lasting memory of the Jubilee. With very little space for individual support and learning in the main school buildings and with limited funds available in an already restricted school budget we have embarked on our challenge to finance and build a safe and secure outside space. As a rural school we felt that a Shepherds Hut would be a suitable building for this and as this is the Queens 70th Jubilee year we thought that it would be appropriate to call it our Jubilee Hut.

We are indeed blessed to have such a wonderful community asset in the centre of our Village. As usual our volunteers have been busy keeping things there in order, safe and accessible for the increasing number of visitors who come to use and enjoy the woods.

You may not know that, with the considerable help of our parish Council, church wood was officially designated as a Local Nature Reserve (LNR) having met the relevant stringent requirements. In order to mark this achievement we are planning to hold a formal opening ceremony of our nature reserve on Thursday 2nd June 2022 at 10.30am, meeting at the top main entrance bridge area and you are most welcome to join us for this. DID YOU KNOW... here is the final part of the story of the construction of the new Marsh Road in 1931. The writer does not appear overly impressed with the new road layout.

A changing landscape.

It is another example of the old order changing and yielding place to the new. The demand for a better and more direct road between Bexhill and Eastbourne is being met but at a cost. Modern engineering has taken up its stand where once the Romans walked, where William and his Normans landed, where for centuries the salt winds have swept across the old marsh, which seemed so remote from that thing called progress.

A landscape is being sacrificed on the altar of the god of speed. Where once the motor car shared with the cow the distinction of winding slowly, perforce, across the lea, the cow will now have to do the winding on its own and raise its puzzled head to watch the cars flash by on the straight, wide way.

Seen from the bottom of the newly cut road, Barnhorn Hill now presents an unusual sight, with high banks, looking almost as if cut with a knife, on either side of the road. A network of little railway lines leads from the excavator, and down them rattle the trucks of earth, drawn by curiously shaped motors fitted with Diesel engines. Twelve trucks at a time are pulled across the marshes right to Pevensey, although at present there is a temporary stoppage, due to the construction of a bridge near the Lamb Inn. *New Bridges*

The laying of the foundations of this bridge, which will take the place of the old Sewers Bridge, is the first feature of interest on the way down the road from the hill. The new road intersects the old lane just before it crosses the dyke at this point and starts on its direct course across the marshes. The bridge will be of the box culvert type. A pile-driver is hard at work, being operated by compressed air, and its thumping noise can be heard in almost any part of the marshes. 12

From this bridge the new road runs south of the old one for about 200 yards, when it intersects it again and then continues westward on the north side to Pevensey. At Middle Bridge a new bridge about 100 yards away from the old one is to be built, and will have a 27 feet span. At Pevensey the old bridge, which carries the road over the dyke into the village, will be rebuilt and widened considerably.

Above flood level

The marsh road will be raised above the highest known flood level, thus making it possible to motor in safety even when the surrounding fields are under water. Much of the earth that is being taken from Barnhorn Hill is being used to help raise the road level.

Work has been in progress on the new road since February, and it is hoped to have it ready for use by the spring of 1933. There still remains an enormous amount of difficult constructional engineering to do, which will take time. In addition, the road which has been cut through Barnhorn Hill has now to be dug to a depth of a foot by means of pick and shovel in order to be cambered, and similar work will have to be carried out all along the route. The length of the road from where it will join Barnhorn-lane to Pevensey is three and three-quarter miles.

What will become of the old road is a question that has yet to be settled.

THE NINFIELD AND DISTRICT ART SOCIETY held their first art exhibition in 2 years on April 9th & 10th at the Memorial hall.

Friday 8th was setting up in the afternoon with plenty of paintings going on display both on the central display unit and on tables around the perimeter of the room.

The footfall of the public was down on previous years probably because the weekend weather was sunny and inviting to enjoy the outdoors. The art work is created by local amateur artists using oils, watercolours, acrylic and pencil and ink covering many topics such as landscapes, animals etc.

Quite a few of the group had the good fortune to sell some of their work, but it was a pleasure just to be able to exhibit our art work for what is primarily a hobby

Our charity this year was for the Ukraine appeal and we hope to give $\pounds 250.00$ towards it.

We meet at the Memorial Hall each Wednesday, 2.00 - 5.00pm. Our numbers are down this year so if there is anyone interested in joining us in a relaxed and informal art group please ring the number in the Parish magazine

We met last Friday 8th April 2022 at Hooe Village Hall, numbers were down as a certain amount of looking after grandchildren was the order of the day. It was a shame as they missed a most interesting and fascinating talk by Sami Guard. Her early life from how she started dancing at 2½years, went to stage school, and went on to have a career full of dancing, singing, acting and latterly directing. She even went to entertain the troops in the Falkland's and worked in some of the leading theatres in the country. A lot more to tell and she has agreed to continue the story sometime later in the year. In the meantime if you want to hear more of her life 21st May at the Memorial Hall in Ninfield is the place to be. The afternoon ended with the usual tea and biscuits between looking at the memorabilia Sami had brought with her. Next meeting is 13th May at 2.00p.m₂₃



Throughout her 95 years of life, Queen Elizabeth II has witnessed a number of historical moments in the United Kingdom and across the world. But she's also made history a number of times over her nearly 70-year reign. In honour of her 95th birthday, Royal Central is taking a look at Her Majesty's monarchical milestones.

The Coronation of Elizabeth II

On 2 June 1953, Elizabeth was crowned at the age of 25 following her accession to the throne upon the death of her father, George VI on 6 February 1952. The Coronation was held more than a year later, following the tradition of allowing an appropriate length of time to pass after a monarch dies before holding such a celebration. The service at Westminster Abbey included an oath in which Elizabeth was anointed with holy oil, invested with robes and regalia, and crowned Queen of the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Pakistan, and Ceylon (now Sri Lanka). So, the "platinum" anniversary jubilee is in 2022 for the Queen's ACCESSION to the throne in 1952, but a platinum commemoration of the CORONATION (which seems unnecessary) will be in 2023.

Following a pattern similar to the coronations of kings and queens before her, there were, however, several parts of the ceremony that were noticeably different. Elizabeth's coronation was the first to be televised in full. The event also used experimental 3D technology and was filmed separately in colour. It's said an average of 17 people watched on each small TV. The Coronation was also the first major world event to be broadcasted internationally on television.

One of those attending the Coronation was Sobhuza II, KBE also known as Nkhotfotjeni, Mona; born 22 July 1899 – 21 August 1982. He was the Paramount Chief and later Ngwenyama of Swaziland for 82 years and 254 days, the longest verifiable reign of any monarch in recorded history. When he was only four months old, his father died suddenly and Sobhuza was chosen king soon after that. His grandmother Labotsibeni and his uncle Prince Malunge led the Swazi nation until his maturity in 1921. Sobhuza led Swaziland through independence until his death in 1982. However, in his own right, he therefore reigned for "just" 60 years.

Silver Jubilee of Elizabeth II

The year 1977 would mark the 25th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's accession to the throne. Throughout the year, the Jubilee was celebrated with large-scale parties and parades across the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth. In June, the official "Jubilee Days" were held to coincide with The Queen's Official Birthday, which is held on the second Saturday of June.

Various places were named after the Jubilee, such as the Jubilee Gardens in South Bank, London, and the Silver Jubilee Bridge that connects Runcorn and Widnes across the Mersey.

Golden Jubilee of Elizabeth II

In 2002, the 50th anniversary of the accession of Queen Elizabeth II was celebrated. Despite the deaths of her sister, Princess Margaret, and her mother, Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother, in February and March, the Jubilee was still marked with large-scale events. Huge crowds turned out despite speculation ahead of the event that it might not reach a wide audience. Over the year, Her Majesty and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, travelled more than 40,000 miles to the Caribbean, Australia, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom before ending the year in Canada.

Diamond Jubilee of Elizabeth II

The year 2012 marked the Diamond Jubilee of Elizabeth II, the 60th anniversary of her accession. The only Diamond Jubilee celebration for any of her predecessors was in 1897, the 60th anniversary of the 1837 accession anniversary of Queen Victoria. In celebration, The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh toured the United Kingdom while other members of the Royal Family toured the Commonwealth as the Monarch's representatives. Numerous events and tributes were held throughout the year across the Commonwealth. A Jubilee pageant was held in London and The Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Trust was set up. The Trust has a mission of leaving a lasting legacy across The Commonwealth.

Sapphire Jubilee of Elizabeth II

On 6 February 2017, the 65th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's reign was marked. This milestone made her the first British monarch to have a Sapphire Jubilee. Unlike her previous Jubilees, there were no widespread public celebrations, and The Queen did not undertake any official engagements. Instead, she spent the day in "quiet reflection" on the anniversary of the death of her father and undertook official work at Sandringham House. Larger scale events took place in June 2016 to mark The Queen's 90th birthday. Extensive celebrations are being reserved for the Platinum Jubilee in 2022. In the same year as her Sapphire Jubilee, The Queen also became the first British monarch to celebrate a platinum wedding anniversary.

Platinum Jubilee of Elizabeth II

June 2022 will see official celebrations across the UK to mark the 70th anniversary of The Queen's accession. In the United Kingdom, an extra bank holiday has been created, and the traditional May bank holiday weekend will be moved to the start of June, creating a special four-day Jubilee weekend.

A Platinum Jubilee medal will be created to mark the occasion. It will be awarded to people who work in public service including representatives of the Armed Forces, emergency services, and prison services. It is also suggested the Severn Bridge, a motorway between Aust, South Gloucestershire, and Chepstow, Monmouthshire in South East Wales be renamed in honour of the Jubilee. Historic Royal Palaces is also planning a Commonwealth-themed garden in the historic moat of the Tower of London.

In May 2021, a campaign known as The Queen's Green Canopy was launched. Encouraging people across the United Kingdom to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee" to mark the milestone. In a statement, Prime Minister of the United Kingdom Boris Johnson said: "As we celebrate Her Majesty's incredible 70 years of service, I encourage everyone to get behind this scheme, and go 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee." This will be the first time any British monarch has celebrated a Platinum Jubilee.

Other milestones

On September 9 2015, The Queen surpassed her great-great-grandmother, Queen Victoria, as the longest-reigning British monarch in history. After the death of King Abdullah of Saudi Arabia on 23 January 2015, The Queen became the oldest reigning monarch in the world. At the time of his death, King Abdullah was 90-years-old. On 13 October 2016, following the death of King Bhumibol of Thailand, The Queen became the longest-serving current head of state.

In the 70 years of her reign, aircraft moved from propellor power to jet engines, from sub sonic to supersonic. Even civilian aircraft became capable of sustained supersonic flight, but dealing with the sonic boom still causes problems.

Man has moved to land on the Moon, to reach other planets in our Solar System and to map the universe in incredible detail. Households have become almost totally electric, electronic and even Wire Free. Televisions are no longer cumbersome cubes but slim enough to rival art pictures, and many household appliances can be operated by voice or computer controls. Phones no longer are tethered to wall sockets but can even be used by pre school children (sometimes more capably than their grandparents).

Cars no longer rely on hand signals, or tiny flick out indicators (although some drivers still don't know about them); and are reaching the stage of being self driven, truly putting the "auto" into auto mobiles.

No longer do we need paper maps to find our way, SatNav in cars, phones, watches (although the reliance on having a phone (or two) ever in, or to, hand

means that pedestrians don't have a clue as to what is going on around them. I anticipate it won't be long before someone texts their partner to "pass the salt, please" such is the reliance of many on their phones.

Shortly before the Queen ascended the throne, the National Health Service had been created, providing medical care to all, not just those that could afford more than the basic rudiments provided by public Workhouses (that also ended in the late 1940's). The NHS has provided much needed care throughout its existence, although there never seems to be enough money to pay the core staff fairly, and sometimes still seems loaded with layers of management.

Other major aspects of the last 70 years: Joining the European Common Market, which due to changes in its scope and ambition grew to become the European Union, seeking commonality in all things throughout its Member Nations (each of which then chose to ignore regulations that affected them, and where financial scrutiny sometimes fell short of accepted standards. All seemed to want to get more out than thy put in, a chaotic financial aspiration, as someone needs to put in more, none seemed to want to do that.

Brexit: Mainly due to the entwining of rules and regulations that never gave the UK due recognition of its potential lead role and whereas Eurovision was at least honest in disregard for the UK, the EU felt that, allowing the UK to leave a club where it paid a lot of the bills, required "dissuasion" rather than co-operation. It was that attitude that probably tipped the balance to a "Leave" vote. Had the EU shown compromise, many Brits would have been happy to Remain, thinking that if they were OK about us leaving, it must be something worth being a part of! Reverse psychology!

The future?

The British monarchy will likely survive and pass to Prince Charles, but which of his names he will take as his title is undecided. He may want to avoid being Charles III in view of the fate of the first two, and Philip could appeal as an acknowledgement of his fathers devoted service to his wife and adopted Country. Whether it then passes to William is too far in the future to know. I hope so, it gives a feeling of service and continuity outside of the hustle and bustle of daily life. Kevin Regan

Just before we changed to bulk milk tank, 18 churns had to be out ready for the milk lorry. But we liked it all really and the cows with their own names, such as Beauty, Darkie, Lovely Beatty, Magpie etc. Those were the days.

Back to May on Rowan Tree Day, May 3rd, sprigs of Rowan, also known as Mountain Ash used to be taken indoors to protect the buildings and its occupants against the Devil, witches and disease. Sprigs were also placed on the thatched roofs so as to protect them against fire. People carried sprigs to ease the pain of rheumatism, whist twigs were also hung around cattle necks or horns to protect them from the evil eye.

A saying for May was that he who shears his sheep before St. Gervatius Day (May 13th), loves his wool more than the sheep. I must remind son of that saying!

I had rather a surprise recently when I went to my garden water tub to fill up the watering can, As I begun to lower the can, two little eyes glared at me. I stopped and stared as there was a rather pretty lizard looking at me, about 5 inches long with 4 legs, a tiny head and a bright red back and tail. It disappeared down under the water and so I carried on watering but I did see it again later, quite briefly, obviously it was suspicious of me. I cannot find out what it really was or how it got there into a big round tub. I have seen it again but when I try to show it to others it will not appear causing comments such as "What have you been drinking" Really!

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FOOD BANK FACTS

WHAT IS THE FOODBANK?

The Bexhill Food bank is opposite Sainsbury's car park in Station Road. The Bexhill and Battle foodbanks are part of the Trussell Trust network which is a National Charity aiming to end hunger in the UK. The aim is to provide emergency food and support to local people locked in poverty. The Trussell Trust campaign for change and lobby parliament to end the need for foodbanks in the UK. In the last year, Bexhill has provided the food for 14,454 meals and Battle has provided 4,458 meals. Each person who comes to the foodbank must be referred to us by a trusted agency such as a health professional, school, job centre coach, CAB, church or approved charity and be given a voucher. This means that they are connected to a service that can help them gain access to other resources with the aim of them not needing to rely on a foodbank. We have seen the use of the foodbank grow in both Bexhill and Battle and expect this trend to continue as the cost of living rises. Even people who are working but on low wages, have needed support.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

By donating tinned food such as baked beans, fish, meat, soup, fruit, vegetables, custard, rice pudding, dried goods such as pasta, rice, noodles, long life milk, juice and squash; toilet rolls, soap, shampoo, deodorant. When the food arrives at the foodbank, it is sorted and shelved in date order and cannot be given out if it is out of date. Smaller packets are more useful than large sized items. Donations of money are a great help as this enables us to buy bread, pay the rent and pay the cost of maintaining the van. We can also purchase items of which we are short.
