Dear Friends,

"Come, ye thankful people come, raise the song of harvest-home"

So the great Harvest Hymn goes that we will sing on 26th September at our harvest services in both Churches. (I hope you get this before the Harvest as this is the October Magazine!) It is not so long ago that our churches would be packed for Harvest Festival particularly in rural situations such as ours. Sadly, that is not the case now as there seems to be so many other pressures on our time. However, during the lockdown at its height, just over 150 accessed the online service I produced each week! That was an amazing figure, especially as many of those would have been a couple of people rather than just one person accessing it! The last online service I produced though had only 32 accessing the service which is a huge reduction. Some of those numbers are accounted by the fact that many of our congregation have now returned to church but that still leaves many who accessed the online services but do not come to church. Not everyone who came before has returned yet, some are housebound, and some are still isolating but things are slowly improving.

It would be interesting to know why people do not come to church when the YouTube figures show that there is a definite interest in the church. Is there something we could do to make it more attractive? The one thing I learnt years ago is that you cannot please everyone, and the most important thing is that people should want to come to church because they realise that without God there is something missing in their life! Perhaps the huge rise in interest in the church during the lockdown was due to people looking for some other meaning in their life, some hope, when hope seemed to be in short supply!

The word church is used in many ways, sometimes referring to the building, sometimes to the people. The church building has stood for centuries and is itself a witness to the presence of God in our community. The people of God change as time goes on, but the most important thing is that the church people are part of the community and as such I firmly believe the church should go out to the people and not wait for the people to come to them.

The future of our churches, and the parish system as a whole, has been in the news quite a lot over the past few months. Things have changed drastically over a fairly short period of time. There are restraints upon our finances and there is a shortage of those coming forward to become priests all of which has had a significant impact upon the way the church operates. I can remember when I was a priest in Norfolk, I was responsible for 4

churches. When I left it was one person to 8 churches, now its 12 churches!!

That is crazy! I had 2 churches in Cambridgeshire 30 years ago, that is now part of 7 churches! In our own 2 parishes here, what was a full-time priest to 2 churches is now me as part time (retired!) and who knows what the future holds. My appointment was for 3 years, or until pastoral reorganisation takes place. That did not happen, and my licence has been extended for a further 3 years! I remember in the news a few years ago that a Priest put a For Sale board outside the church. Of course, it was not really going to be sold, but it caused a major talking point in the community around the importance of supporting the local church. Both of our church buildings have stood witness to God for centuries and I sincerely hope they will continue to do so for many more centuries. If there are any ideas to make attending church more attractive, I would be more than pleased to hear them. In the meantime, let's make this Harvest a time to really give thanks for what is hopefully an end to lockdown!!

At the September Parish Council meeting we were pleased to welcome a number of residents at the meeting which was only the 2nd face to face meeting since the start of the pandemic. We have a number of long serving parish councillors as well as some who have joined in the last 5 years, Councillor Sami Guard was celebrating the 18th anniversary of her first ever Parish Council meeting this month.

Residents had asked questions about the wild flower verges which were answered in the meeting. Following a successful application to the AONB Partnership we have been awarded £2700 for the project. The questions and answers given can be found in the draft minutes of the meeting and on our website where you will also find the management plan.

Rev Paul Frostick regularly attends the Parish Council meeting and he has alerted us to the fact that the churchyard only has a few plots left. There will be more discussions on this topic in future months and Rev Paul will be writing more in the next Parish news too.

Having donated the village owned red telephone box to the history society the Parish Council and the History Society are working together on a project to move it from its current position in Potmans Lane to the centre of the village. 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HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

We are happy to report that we restarted our monthly meetings in August with a visit by Peter White who gave an entertaining talk on Town Criers and Bellmen, past and present, followed in September by Dr. Sandra Voss who spoke on Herstmonceux Observatory and Science Centre. Our speaker in October is to be a return of Ken Brookes and his specialist subject, Fossil Folklore. Ken has spoken to us a number of times, including a visit to the Fairlight cliffs and his knowledge on this subject is extensive. We are very much looking forward to seeing Ken again. Our next meeting will be on 21st October

DID YOU KNOW... this month (and next) returns to a subject that Sam Botes first wrote about in this magazine in, I think, about 2012 – the Tithe Riots – which had a significant impact in Hooe. The Bexhill Observer carried the following story on Saturday 4th June, 1932:-

Effigy of Lord St. Audries burnt at Hooe Tithe Sale yesterday

Amazing scenes, following an abortive tithe sale at Hooe yesterday (Friday) morning, culminated in the siege, by an angry crowd, of the Red Lion Inn. Never before has the quiet village of Hooe witnessed such exciting scenes. The siege of the inn was the climax to a morning of angry protest against the tithe levy, and farmers from all parts of East Sussex, together with practically all the villagers, gathered to register their indignation in the liveliest possible fashion.

Iniquitous robbery.

Prior to the sale at Sadler's Farm the gathering was addressed from a farm cart near the haystack by Mr. G. Butcher (chairman the Rye and Northiam branch of the East Sussex Tithepayers' Association) and Mr. A. Wadman (chairman of the Hailsham branch). Mr. Butcher described their cause as a just one, and its great strength lay in its justice. Those responsible for the collection of tithe had been compared to Shylock. The law allowed them and the Court awarded them their tithe, but they would find when they came to collect it that the farmers could put up just as much opposition as Shylock found when he tried to exact his pound of flesh. (Applause and laughter.) Mr. Wadman declared: "No Member of Parliament cares a damn for us. We are too scattered and our votes do not count much to them." He urged the members of the association to make their voices heard in the matter of tithe, which he said was iniquitous robbery. (Hear, hear.)

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Effigy burned.

Motor cars, over 50 in number, lined the road from the Red Lion to Sadler's Farm, and the crowd was in the region of 300. An effigy of Lord St. Audries, to whom the tithe at both farms is payable, was erected by village youths near the haystack at Sadler's Farm, and beside it they placed a card bearing the words:

"Lord St. Audries. Approx. £600 year for nothing. The parson, £300 a year. Total, £900, all out of about 20 farmers at Hooe. Is it fair?"

The property to be distrained here was the haystack, for which no bids were forthcoming, although a member of the crowd humorously remarked, "I'll give your fourpence halfpenny" and Mr. Saunders, of the Hastings County Court, by whom the proceedings were conducted, declared that the stack was not sold, at which there was applause.

After the Sadler's Farm fiasco, everybody made the quarter of a mile journey to Broad Street Farm, and here the real trouble began. The effigy and board were carried aloft along the road, and on arrival at the farm they were placed in a prominent position on a mound in front of the auctioneer's stand. On the gate of the cow byre a bill was posted which read:

"Lower tithe or none at all means more employment."

When Mr. Budd reached the farm, derisive epithets were hurled at him, and as he proceeded to read the conditions of sale the paraffin-soaked effigy was ignited and a great cheer went up from the crowd as the flames shot upwards and the straw stuffing crackled furiously.

Jeers and cheers.

Mr. Budd's protests were in vain. He continued to read the conditions of sale, but still the cheering and the laughter went on. Jeers mingled with the cheers, a pitchfork was thrust into the effigy, and as it was tossed into the air shouts went from the crowd, "We cannot hear you."

Mr. Budd retorted: "It is your own fault. You won't give me a chance." The noise subsided slightly and someone shouted: "We haven't heard a single word of what you have said. "I have read the conditions of sale and it is your fault if you have not heard them," said Mr. Budd. "In that yard I have two pigs for sale - That was as far as he got. Again the crowd broke out into prolonged cheering, jeering and laughter. Abusive comments were flung at the auctioneer, and behind him stood a man persistently offering Mr. Budd cough-drops from a paper-bag!

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"Will someone make me a bid for the two pigs?" asked Mr. Budd. Again, nothing but jeers. "Right" he said. "Once, twice, three times. The pigs are not sold." Catcalls and hooting continued for about five minutes and then Mr. Budd, pointing to a field a quarter of a mile away, said: "Over there you will find six heifers.

"Bring them here." yelled the crowd, uproarious in their mirth. A bid of £1 was offered for the heifers, but Mr. Budd would not accept this. No higher bid was made, and he declared that the heifers were not sold.

An ugly situation immediately threatened. An onlooker approached Mr. Budd and demanded why he had conducted the sale. "I am not personally interested," Mr. Budd replied. "Yes you are," rejoined his questioner in a loud voice. "Why did you take the dirty job on?"

"May ask you fair Question?" said Mr. Budd. "If you buy a house on leasehold you buy it with your eyes open?"

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
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News, Views and Future Fun - from Sami!!

Despite the rather unseasonable weather this summer we have enjoyed a good flow of visitors to Church Wood and the volunteers have been encouraged by the many favourable comments received. Our work has continued much as before with the initial priority to be to stop the flow of water from Moor Pond into Church Pond. Sadly this meant the previous seating area in the hollow had to be removed to enable a broad dam to be constructed and, many wheelbarrows of hardcore and clay later, all our efforts seem to have worked. Our thanks to the resident who kindly contributed the raw material from his rebuilt driveway.

The original seating was set aside and we have now been able to create a new picnic area adjacent to the dam, with a better outlook over Church Pond. This continues to show the plaque to Cynthia Pettet, a long term volunteer with NVS. As this goes to Press we are still adding to the seating but please do come down to the Wood to enjoy the view!

Other urgent attention was focused on the pipe which feeds Moor Pond. It had blocked due to the ingress of root growth and had flooded adjacent pathways. In addition, a tree had come down close to Robins Pool and was in danger of blocking the outlet from Church Wood into the neighbouring property. We endeavour to remove such obstructions as quickly as possible to ensure the smooth flow of water away from Church Wood and to enable visitors to enjoy every part of the woods when they visit. People also remembered the Lewes Martyrs, burned at the stake during the reign of Mary I for refusing to accept Catholicism. With Guy Fawkes discovered in the cellars underneath the old Houses of Parliament, the passing of the Observance of 5th November Act in 1606 formally encouraged the commemoration of the failure of the plot.

But 5 November was another remarkable day in Britain's history when, in 1688 William of Orange landed at Torbay and started the Glorious Revolution when he was invited to invade England, to accept the vacated crown, jointly with his wife Mary (the daughter of James II in order to retain The Church of England and end Catholicism as the state religion. Thus the last of the Stuart Kings led to the establishment of Protestant rule, via his own daughter. The 1689 Bill of Rights, established the Monarchy as separate from Church and State (Parliament).

W Sussex, with the ending of profitable smuggling, Bonfire Societies began to adopt the guernseys (Jersey comes from another Channel Island) to parade dressed as seamen with white trousers and a striped (Guernseystyle) jumper. In time, they adopted individual patterns as identification.

Guernsey Jumpers are derived from the traditional sweaters developed in Guernsey in the 17th century. The original sweater styles, with a "diamond" insert at the underarm for ease of movement, were worn primarily by Guernsey's fisherman, the jumper later became popular throughout coastal Britain where each seafarer wore a "Gansey". Channel Islanders handknitted distinctive stitch patterns into the jumper including ribbing at the top of the sleeve, to mirror a sailing ships rope ladder; a garter stitch panel depicting breaking waves and stitching on the sweater shoulders representing pebbles, stones and sand. Many families had their own variation of the patterns in their knitwear that became a means of recognition when unfortunate sailors were lost at sea. Much the same reason is found with Fair Isle sweaters, with distinctive "family" patterns. Often they would be knitted by a young mans fiancée, sometimes combining the pattern of both families. Guernsey became the name for fishermen's sweaters, also for football and other sportswear. Jersey sweaters became the style for leisure, gradually becoming plain.


A short story from the Bible
