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News from St Oswald's

Following the sad death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, we opened a Book of Condolence, lowered the Union Flag to half mast and muffled the bells. Beside the Book was a framed photo of Her Majesty and a lit candle. The Church remained open daily from 9.30 to dusk.,

Quinquennial Repairs

Every five years the fabric of the church building is professionally surveyed. Following the survey the work needed included stone work repairs to South Porch, doorway, stone work and repointing around a number of the windows. Tower roof tiles and lead work and repointing of Chancel Roof tiles. The work will take about 4 weeks and due to start 20th September.

<u>Bells</u>

The work was finally finished on Thursday 28th July at a cost of just under £30,000. Matthew Higby & Co. will return after 12 months to do a check/service of the work. This is part of the original contract and there is no charge. Thereafter bells should be serviced regularly and if we commission Higby's the charge would be £165.00 + VAT & t**avel costs.

Occasional campers

We have had a number of visitors in camper vans and vans. Our policy now is to welcome the occasional overnight visit, offer facilities (but ask them to dispose of their rubbish elsewhere following the overloading of our dustbin) and to suggest that whilst occasional visits will be welcomed, nothing more permanent. One benefit of a fairly friendly policy was that

Churchvard

Alan Tipping has listed all the wildlife and plants (grasses and wildflowers) he has identified so far from his walks round the churchyard–although it is by no means complete and he hopes to be able to continue. Sussex Wildlife Trust has a list of different years in which different species have been identified in Hooe Churchyard but at present we are unable to access this list. In the meantime, we have bought some Yellow Rattle seeds (to inhibit the grass and promote wildflowers) and Alan will sow these later in the autumn as they require a period of cold before they will germinate. He has already sown some Hedge Bedstraw seeds

News from St. Mary's

As many you will be aware we have had two organs in the church for a number of years a fine Wind Organ and a newer Electronic Organ. Our previous organist preferred to play the electronic organ but unfortunately after the Covid pandemic and lockdown he was unable to continue playing.

Our new organist prefers the wind organ and it has been a delight to listen to the sounds during services, weddings and funerals. As the organ had not been used regularly until recently, we arranged for a survey to ensure it was in good working order. Regrettably this has shown up a number of problems which require urgent attention if we are to continue to use it. The surveyor indicated that if this work is not done, the situation will only get worse and involve far greater expenditure in the future. The cost of the repairs is upwards of £1,500. We have seen a fall in the numbers in the congregation since Covid leaving the church finances in a very precarious state. In view of this we are making an urgent appeal to the village for any donations to help us keep this wonderful organ in good working order.

OUR SCHOOL

Who's School is it?

On Monday 12th September Parents at Ninfield Primary school were given the outcome of the OFSTED inspection that was carried out in June of this year. The Inspectors have graded the school as inadequate, having serious weaknesses in the arrangements for Safeguarding of Children. The only issue found with the provision of education was an issue with the curriculum which is down to the problems of trying to implement a seven year curriculum in a school with only 6 classes.

Unfortunately, any serious weaknesses in Safeguarding immediately rates the school as inadequate regardless of the educational qualities, and therefore we will be subject to an Academy order.

The Head Teacher, who is also the Designated Safeguarding Lead was unavailable during the inspection and a request to have the Inspection delayed because of this was rejected. The 2019 OFSTED Inspection praised the schools' safeguarding processes and subsequent termly visits by the Local Authority have not highlighted any issues. So, this judgement has come as a shock to us all.

The Local Authority immediately suspended the recruitment of a new Head Teacher and took over financial control of the school after the Inspection in June, but we have been unable to discuss it publicly until the publication of the final report.

The Governing Body were asked to recommend the implementation of an Interim Executive Board to prepare the school to be taken over by an Academy Trust. We do not believe implementing an IEB and seeking Academy status is the right way forward for our village school. We therefore, regrettably, decided to resign our positions with immediate effect on publication of the report. One Parent Governor, Greg Walker, has agreed to stay on in the interim to ensure that all the concerns of parents are raised. We have always acted with the best interests of the children at heart. We would never do anything to put them in danger and we do not believe that anyone has been put at risk because of our actions. We believe that a village school should be a part of the community and should be a place where children can grow both personally and intellectually. We hope that the changes now being implemented do not alter that philosophy and we do not become so risk averse that the opportunities afforded by being a small village school are lost in the regulations.

Thank you for all the support that you have given us in the past and the kind comments I have received for my past scribblings.

HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

Hooe History Society meeting for October will feature one of our favourite returning speakers, Ian Everest, with his talk "Flanders and the Somme, now and then". We try to ask Ian back regularly as he has such wonderful stories to tell on a wide range of subjects and he never fails to impress. We are continuing to conduct our meetings in Hooe Church so Thursday 20th October at 7.30 is the designated time and place.

DID YOU KNOW...the "Old Marsh Road" was, in the early 1900's, referred to as the "Under Lane" between the Lamb Inn and Stone Bridge (which is about 150 yards west of the café at the bottom of Barnhorn Hill).

In 1909, the County Council commenced proceedings to impose a speed limit on this stretch of road following a number of incidents and in November 1910 an enquiry was held at the Lamb Inn, led by Mr. R.C. Maxwell, an Inspector of the Local Government Board. He heard from a number of witnesses who gave details of incidents that had occurred along the road. Arthur Lemmon (from Holmes Farm, Hooe) who was the Chairman of Hailsham Rural District Council, said that he lived about three miles from Under-lane, in which there was a good deal of traffic throughout the year, especially in the summer. The road was used by traffic between Eastbourne and Hastings, of which three-quarters of it was motor traffic. Several narrow escapes had occurred in the lane, and the Hailsham Rural District Council was unanimous in making representation to the County Authority on the subject.

Mr. J. Brand, of the Grove, Hooe, who is a member of the County Council, said that in the month of June a motor lorry got too far into the ditch while passing another vehicle, and it had to be pulled out of the ditch the next day. In the same month of June, as his (Mr Brand's) wife was passing along the lane a motor car struck the wheel of her trap. Witness estimated that he had seen cars pass along the road at the rate of 45 miles hour. Two other

witnesses, including P.C. Curtis of Hooe, gave evidence of vehicles and pedestrians that had required assistance following incidents.

Mr Dean of the RAC opposed the application on the grounds that there were no dwellings in the vicinity and therefore very few pedestrians. To impose a speed limit would set a precedent for other similar roads to be considered in the same way. He suggested that lowering the height of hedgerows would be sufficient to improve the visibility along the road and eliminate any concealed dangers.

In January 1911, the decision of the inspector was published, as follows:-

"The application to the Local Government Board for an order for a speed limit for motor cars has been successful. The Board intend to enforce a limit of ten miles per hour for motor cars over so much of Under Lane, Hooe, as extends for 200 yards in an easterly direction from a point opposite the western extremity of the Lamb Inn; and as much as extends from a point in the lane 20 yards west of its junction with the road leading to Broad Street Green to the boundary of the parish at Stonebridge. The speed limit comes into operation next Monday".

Church Wood has fared well recently with its ponds and streams maintaining a reasonable level but it is apparent that several trees are showing signs of stress. Hopefully the rain has arrived in time and will be in sufficient quantities to prevent major problems arising. However we have had to remove a dangerous tree at Robins Pond, the timber from which will be recycled into future projects.

Regular visitors will have noticed that we have planted a number of young saplings throughout Church Wood, clearly apparent in their plastic tubes to protect them from rabbits etc. In addition, we have created a new picnic area just off the main public footpath, also with access from the fitness trail we had created previously. It has been encouraging to see that this facility is already being used.

Despite water shortages, the pond water seems to readily find ways of creating alternative routes to escape and considerable time has been spent reinforcing the banks and blocking the holes created by creatures or left when dead tree roots rot away. Fortunately we have been joined by three new volunteers so it has made tackling these projects much more straight forward than recently. If you are interested in joining us, please do come along one Wednesday morning.

Sadly, it is disappointing to have to report a marked increase in dog fouling along Church Path and on the path into the wood. Please bag it and bin it, or take it home for your black waste bin.

Finally, The Society wishes to thank the family of Jim Hoad for their kind contribution to our funds which will enable us to continue our work in Church Wood and throughout Ninfield

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
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NINFIELD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

The Crown of Scotland

Since the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II at her favourite place, Balmoral, there has been much reference to Scotland's role in her life. The Crown traces back to the Stuart kings, when after the death of Queen Elizabeth I, the Crowns of both Scotland and England were united in James VI of Scotland becoming James I of England.

The Crown of Scotland is the crown used at the coronation of the monarchs of Scotland. Remade in its current form for King James V of Scotland in 1540, the crown is part of the Honours of Scotland, the oldest surviving set of Crown jewels in the British Isles. The crown dates from at least 1503 when, in an earlier form, it was depicted in the portrait of King James IV in the Book of Hours commissioned for his marriage to Margaret Tudor.

In January 1540, King James V commissioned the royal goldsmith, John Mosman, to refashion the Crown of Scotland. The existing crown was delicate and had been repaired at least twice in the previous 30 years, including the loss of a fleur-de-lis. The crown was melted down, and Mosman added 41 oz. of Scottish gold mined at Crawford Moor in Lanarkshire.

Constructed of solid gold, the crown consists of a base with fleurs-de-lis alternating with crosses fleury. The arches of the crown are decorated with gold and red oak leaves. At the intersection of the arches is a golden monde, painted blue with gold stars. The monde is surmounted by a large cross, decorated in gold and black enamel with pearls. The crown is encrusted with 22 gemstones, including garnets, amethysts, 20 precious stones and 68 Scottish freshwater pearls.

James V ordered a purple and ermine bonnet from tailor Thomas Arthur of Edinburgh to fit inside the crown. James VII ordered the colour of the bonnet be changed to red. The bonnet has been replaced several times, the present bonnet in 1993. The completed crown weighs (3lb 10oz). The bonnet is also called a cap of maintenance, from its use in maintaining the heavy crown from being uncomfortable.

The last times the crown was used was for the Scottish coronations of both Charles I in 1633 and Charles II in 1651.

The symbolism of the Crown of Scotland being placed prominently on Queen Elizabeth's coffin may signify it perhaps being used to crown King Charles III

It's perhaps easy to forget that from at least the time of the Normans, efforts had been made to subjugate the Scottish monarchy to England. But it took the death of Queen Elizabeth I for the Crowns to be united, not through war, but by diplomacy. And far from England conquering Scotland, it was Scotland that emerged with the monarch to unite both Countries.

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Too Hot

My goodness it's hot, it's now a race to see who falls over first, me or my dog. I shall put it down to the heat, but I have been waving at Spitfires again.

My morning walks are at least at the coolest time of day, but are lacking in any form of wild life. The grass is dried to a crisp, what flowers remain are way past their best and the birds have all but stopped singing. With clear blue sky and an ever present high pressure, it is a good time to be by the water. Not the sea though, I fell for that once. I have learnt a new word down here, that is not used in Lincolnshire, Rammed. This is a good descriptive word describing well the total shutdown of parking places and people playing sardines on every square inch of beach. Looks like the river then.

My grandson is keen to try and learn how to fish, so an evening session was planned. I have seen plenty of small roach swimming around the bridge at horse walk, so there is the spot to go. Yes I do have a licence and permit.

Now high pressure and heat is not good for fishing, but not being after large fish I thought we might have a chance. It was not to be, for three hours we watched a stationary float, not even a twitch. The young lad tried to stay focused, but I could see his mind wandering. It was then I heard the Spitfire.

The sound was a long way off, but ever coming closer. Then we saw it, no more than a field away. It was a spontaneous thing, we both waved at once. I'm not sure if it is out of respect for the plane and its pilots or some subtle response to the sound of pure power that makes us stand and wave. I like to think it's a little of both.

The response came as the Spitfire did a perfect loop and carried on it's way. But that was not the end of it, the sound of the Spitfire diminished and then came back. With a huge rush of sound the plane came on us at tree top height. So close it seemed to blot out the sky. How can you possibly top that, the fishing ended and home wood bound.

There are a lot of trees in East Sussex, not that many in Lincolnshire so driving into a setting sun here is different. Lincolnshire has vast sky's and if you adjust the sun visor you can cope with a setting sun. Here you are dealing with the darkness under a canopy of leaves and suddenly a totally blinding light. So a note to self, don't drive at sun set unless going west.

A short one this month, its 30 C in my hut at this moment and some bright spark has just said we will have this for at least another four days. We had it like this in 1976, possibly even hotter. The leaves dropped in late August. Still that was in my motor biking times, every mile an hour you go over sixty it drops one degree. 'Speed kills, so ride a BSA and live', so goes the saying. I had a choice, except the heat or vibrate my fillings out pushing the old BSA beyond its happy limits.

The day had gone well, I coped with the route march around Rye and had settled down of an evening to watch Lord of the Rings with my grand son. The phone rang and what I heard next struck me really hard. 'The Queen is dead, Long Live The King' It was my son, Queen's Company Grenadier Guards, retired on a war pension.

With that dear lady's last breath the continuity of our country moved to its next phase. Within a blink of an eye Queen's company will have become King's company and the pledge of loyalty to the monarchy upheld.

The whole of my life there has been but one Queen, always there. At times not really thought of, at others a figure head for our happiness or grief. As someone said on the news last night, 'the glue that kept us all together'.

I was 16 and in the queue for school dinner when the word got round that Hendrix had died. I had just got home for some lunch after a long mornings game keeping when I heard Princess Diana had lost her life. My dad passed and that day will not be forgotten. Now our Queen dies on my birthday.

Today is the 9th of September and this morning I walked the dog around the Church as usual. I am not an emotional sort of chap but today I seem to be wearing my emotions on my cuff. There was Simon on the Church spire setting the flag to half mast. This tiny Church down a long narrow lane, out in the fields on its own has been touched by the Queens passing. So then will have every inch of this land and the Commonwealth. Perhaps she was the glue that bonded us all together.

I really don't have any more words except 'God save the King'. AT

We recently sent a batch of cattle to market, Hailsham market that is or to call it by its professional name South East Marts. On this occasion I went to see them actually being sold and after checking that all was well after their short trip in a cattle lorry, I settled myself down on seats round the ring where I could keep an eye of the auctioneer and possible buyers. As I waited for the sale to begin, my mind went back to the first time I visited the market: It was 1939 and the people of Hailsham had been instructed to go to the market to be fitted with gas masks. Mum, Gran and I joined the queue to be fitted and the right one for me was packed into a cardboard box and hung from my shoulder. Mum and Gran followed me with Gran muttering that she was not going to wear that 'awful thing'. In fact none of us actually had to wear them, despite the many air raids over our heads in Hailsham there were thankfully no gas attacks.

The market was an interesting place to walk around, to see all the animals duly penned in groups, cattle, sheep, pigs and chickens already to be sold. In actual fact Gran did buy some poultry that day which we kept at the bottom of the garden together with pens of rabbits. These were not for pets but to help bolster our food rations and it was in those days I learnt to pluck poultry and skin rabbits etc, all of which was very useful when I became a farmer's wife.

Also at the market in these days were stalls of vegetables & fruit & clothes, of course these disappeared when rationing began, but then I stopped reminiscing when a loud bell rang out to gather people round as the sale began. It was a little nerve wracking as the various lots of cattle made their way into the ring and bidding started. Mine came in about half way through and sold well with the auctioneer keeping his eye on me as well as the buyers, making sure I was happy with the price before the hammer fell. It was a good morning and I came home well pleased to pass the results onto son, But no other stalls to browse through these days however there is still a good cafe on site ready to provide coffee and food to enjoy and compare notes with the other people at market. It was a good morning but as I came home I wondered where my gas mask went to all those years ago!

Super-veg Pasta

Ingredients

- 2 red peppers , quartered and deseeded
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 fennel bulb, roughly chopped
- 1 onion, roughly chopped
- 1 large carrot, roughly chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- ½ tsp crushed chillies
- 1 tsp fennel seeds
- 2 tbsp tomato purée
- 400g can chopped tomatoes

- 1 tsp caster sugar

- 500g bag fresh egg pasta, cooked

Step 1 Heat the grill and pop the peppers, skin-side up, underneath for 10 mins or until beginning to char. Transfer to a bowl, cover and set aside. When cool enough to handle, peel off the skin and cut the flesh into strips.

Step 2 Heat the oil in a large saucepan and cook the fennel, onion and carrot for 8-10 mins until softened. Stir in the garlic, crushed chillies, fennel seeds and tomato purée, cook for 2 mins, then add the canned tomatoes, stock and sugar. Simmer, uncovered, for 15 mins or until the vegetables are completely soft.

Step 3 Take out a couple of spoonfuls of the sauce (this will later add texture), then blend the rest in the saucepan until almost smooth with a stick blender. Simmer for 5 mins to thicken, then stir in the reserved sauce, shredded basil and peppers. Serve with the pasta.
