Dear Friends,

This edition may come out just before our harvest festival and the Pet service in Ninfield. The main point to stress about both services is that all are welcome! Of course, in Ninfield that includes pets although we have always welcomed dogs at services so long as they are well behaved. We shall see what happens at the Pet Service!

At a baptism service there are some important words of welcome that really say a lot of what baptism is about. It is not about something that happens to the child or adult immediately at baptism, rather it is a start on the long journey of faith. "We welcome you into the fellowship of faith; we are children of the same heavenly Father; we welcome you". To my thinking the welcome we give to people in church is one of the most important things we do as part of their spiritual journey.

The church environment though is strange to some people, understandably so, as they are not used to it. A friendly welcome is important but it's what happens during the service that is also important. People need to feel they are part of it.

It is one thing to say that all are welcome at church regardless of background etc, the reality of what they find is also important! The one thing true of all of us is that we are sinners, no-one is perfect (not even me!). I do get annoyed when someone is refused being able to get married in church because they are divorced. If we are not careful what we are saying is that God forgives but the church does not. We all deserve a second chance! In many areas of life, I am constantly being given a second chance, and I still often get it wrong.

On the subject of weddings, do you know you can now get married in any church even if you have no connection to that church. You just need to regularly attend that church in the 6 months before the wedding. It does not define regular, so I say once a month. We also welcome funerals in church for anyone who requests it. To be buried in the churchyard though you do need to live in the parish or have a close connection. This is partly because of the limited number of spaces we have left. There is also a growing number of direct cremations taking place, presumably mostly to do with cost. It is possible to have a memorial service after such cremations, and I am happy to provide this in either church.

So, all are warmly welcome at both of our churches. If you feel uneasy because you don't quite know what is going on, don't worry. We all had to start somewhere! If there is something you don't know just ask. If we don't know we know someone who does!!

I look forward to seeing you.

Although the rain caused a certain disruption to the afternoon, the Villagers and friends, still turned up and supported the Church, so thank you all for coming along. We must also thank all our helpers. All those that came to set up and clear up; the helpers who manned the stalls and sideshows, both in the rain and in the dry; the ladies for the serving, cake making and the washing up; the Bellringers for the Tower Tours; the Hooe Village Band and all who helped in any small way to make the event so successful.

We can report that, Janet and Simon Pattisson are safely settling in their new home in Somerset. A small number of us were able to join them to celebrate their 60th Wedding Anniversary at the end of July. They should now be moved into the "Granny" annex that was being prepared for them. We wished them well. They sent their thanks to the village for the many cards and Garden Token that we had given them as a farewell gift.

In church it has been a quiet summer. We welcomed Fabian at his first communion after his Confirmation at Ashburnham on 14th July. The rest of church life continued quietly.

We have had a slight set back with progress of the Toilet extension. After seeking Planning Permission from Wealden DC and hoping for the go ahead, the news came back that the Wealden Archaeologist was concerned that there may be the foundations of a pre-existing porch on the north side of the church. He suggested that we needed a further Geo Survey to confirm this. This was another stumbling block but we were able to get the survey completed on the 18th August. The preliminary report is with our Architect who will be discussing this with Wealden DC and the Diocese.

One further unfortunate occurrence. There was evidence that there had been an attempt to break into the new shed. Later it was

apparent that the key safe had also been butchered and broken. The good news is that 'they' were unsuccessful.

We now look forward to Harvest on 28th September and then the preparations for Christmas.

There are several comments in the visitors' book about how well our church is cared for, so, many thanks to our team of cleaners and flower arrangers.

COUNTRY WAYS

The Bullfinch

Moving around my small garden is quite an obstacle course, the summer growth has taken over. It will get trimmed back come back end, that's autumn as a translation from Lincolnshire's back end.

I have lived and worked in the countryside all my life where things are viewed differently. The vegetables are at the allotment and here I have more interesting things to see than cultivated flowers.

My small space serves many purposes. It gives me a space where I can sit and be out of sight. There is a riot of colour, especially during the spring. Birds can nest here and not be disturbed and because the abundance of plant growth is left uncut all types of life flourishes.

We do gets rats here, so not all types of life flourish. I catch dozens each year, if I don't they would invade my space which is not such a wise thing to do. So apart from rat's and the odd hornet we all seem to get along quite well.

Bird feeders are a bit of an issue because they do attract rats. The only time now days I put food out for the birds in the occasional slice of bread. This I soak in water, to give it weight, and place it then on a bird table. The sparrows flock to it and it matters not if I am sitting next to it. My space is filled with birds chattering and fighting over the food. The black bird has a bit more decorum and waits by my feet for the tit bit he knows I'm holding back for him. The pigeons and doves just wait for me to go in. I don't think a list is warranted because I do get quiet a few birds here but perhaps a special mention is required.

A male bullfinch and a fledgling were on my path, the adult showing the young one where to find something nice to eat. It was wonderful to see, not just because bullfinches are not common any more but it has to be one of my favourite birds to watch. If ever there was a need to explain why I don't cut hedges in spring or summer then there it is. I would be mortified if I had destroyed its nest.

Following on from the spring blossom I have countless buddleia plants which gives endless flowering heads. They smell and look nice but it is the butterflies they attract which makes them so desirable. For

the last few years there were hardly any butterflies about, but this year they are covered. Shan't bother you with a list but there are reds, oranges and browns flitting all over the place. Pride of place this year goes again to a moth. The humming bird moth, it looks and flies just like a humming bird, has again spent some time here. So I have scent, colour, interest and movement, not bad for a few plants.

There is a project going on and that is I've left a wasp nest to get on with it. Its right in the way by the back door but I am manfully carrying on ignoring it. We are working on the theory of, if you leave me alone then I shan't bother you. So far its working and I expect it will until the nest dies off come back end. September wasps are a pain in the posterior, they get drunk on fermented apples and have a desire to stink someone before they die off. The queen will over winter.

They to have their place in the great scheme of things! AT

HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

Our speaker this month is David Clarke with his talk on The Ogre of Brede.

In the 16th century, it was said that a giant prowled the streets of Brede looking for children to eat for supper. It may have been a cautionary tale but that is to discount the legends borne out of religious strife that surround the village, of smugglers, a matchless Madonna, a biblical misprint, body snatchers and that rather macabre tale of the Sussex Cannibal. We meet, as usual, in St Oswald's church on Thursday, 16th October 2025 at 7.30 p.m.

DID YOU KNOW...I am going to acknowledge the incredible work of the British Newspaper Archive in this month's issue. It is a constantly evolving subscription website which uploads images of very many newspapers for us to see and transcribe. For me this is a valuable tool when carrying out my research as many of the articles written in the 20th century appear to be factual and really quite accurate.

I originally looked up the exploits of the Russells Green tug-o-war team in Bexhill library and thought I had covered them fairly comprehensively. Recently, however, this website has started to upload many more articles on this brilliant team, so I am constantly adding to the archive. I now have newspaper reports from as far afield as Somerset, to Reading and Peterborough as well as local events in Sussex and Surrey. There was even a write up in the London Evening News about the team training at Akehurst Farm with a picture of them pulling a concrete block up the oak tree! Slowly, there is a more complete picture emerging of the team that started out in the late 1950's and which initially struggled against the more established sides - West Sussex Police, Outwood (Staffs) Bosley (Cheshire) New Haw and Woodham, Croydon (both London) and Broadmoor staff (Berkshire) before turning the corner in the early 1960's and beating them all, becoming national champions at various weight categories. One article that I had originally missed in the Bexhill Observer that I found especially pleasing is worth repeating. Entitled Russells Green celebrate, it is an end of season function in the village hall in December 1964.

"As an expression of the team's thanks to all those who have assisted them to achieve their most successful season to date, and one in which they became champions of England in their sport, Russells Green tug o' war team arranged a dinner at Hooe Village Hall last Saturday to which all were

invited. At the dinner the club president (Mr. C. King) in praising the team's "reasonable success" in climbing to the top of the ladder, expressed the hope that they would achieve "greater success still in the seasons to come. "The food was prepared at the adjacent Red Lion Inn and the cost was met by the team in gratitude for the assistance they have received from many sides during the year. Liquid refreshment was at the expense of the president.

Proposing a toast to the helpers on behalf of the club, Mr. King said it would be invidious to mention the names of any of the ladies who had given up their time and labour for the club, but he would like sincerely to thank them as a whole. "I do not know where this club would be without them," he added. "I would like also to thank Mr. Wilfred Barton for his provision of a meeting place at the Red Lion and for accommodating our various trophies and cups, and also Mr. H. B. Unicombe and Mr. Lewis for their splendid efforts on behalf of the club".

The club chairman (Mr. Jack Walters) who helped to form the original club and who formerly pulled on many occasions as anchor man for the team, said how glad he was that all the guests were able to be present. Mr. Walters made reference to the visit recently of a Southern Television camera team to Russells Green and to the subsequent feature televised on Wednesday of last week, on the club's exploits. 'This is a speech of very few words but I would like to wish the team a very successful season next year,' he added".

NINFIELD LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

At our last meeting on 14 August 2025, we were treated to a talk by Rob Slater on the history of Pevensey. It was a timely presentation as it aligned nicely with the Pevensey History Festival organised by Rob and which featured many interesting talks, tours and events. This meeting was followed by our annual outing in September comprising a guided tour of historic Pevensey. In his final starring role, Rob will be talking to us on 9 October when he will be talking about "Sussex Ghosts and Legends". Not to be missed!

This area is awash with history and none more significant than the invasion of Britain by Duke William of Normandy some 959 years ago. Many consider it the most pivotal moment in British history and perhaps you have been enthralled by the BBC's current epic historical drama covering the period, King and Conqueror, the story of the fight for the English crown. These dramas are gripping to watch but inevitably we are drawn into the issue of historical accuracy. Trying to compress a period of over 20 years into eight 50 minutes episodes is a challenge and liberties are taken. Perhaps we can excuse some events happening out of order, or characters dying in places and times which are not authentic. But there is a scene in episode four which will undoubtedly shock you. It is the demise of one of the most significant characters in the story, Emma of Normandy, Edward the Confessor's mother. Now Emma was the daughter of Richard I of Normandy, and she became Queen Consort to Aethelred the Unready (Edward's father) and then King Cnut. She is the only woman to have married two English kings. So, she was at some point invested in all three warring factions and was considered a formidable political operator. But ultimately, once Edward is on the throne, he takes away her wealth, her lands are removed from her, and she is sent to Winchester into retirement where she lives the remainder of her days. But the scene in the drama? As historian Tom Licence, says, "... beating to death Emma, with a crown? No, no. Just no."

Ninfield Local History Group meets each month at the Methodist Hall in Church Lane, on the second Thursday of each month 7:30 p.m. -9:00 p.m. We also open our archives each quarter at the Sparkes Pavilion so that you can view photographs and documents relating to the village and the surrounding area, talk to a local expert and share your stories.



God had told Gideon he would drive the Midianite invaders out of His country. 32000 men had come to fight with Gideon.






If You are really going to help me, tomorrow this wool will be wet but the ground be dry.
